WINNIPEG WAS CONTROLLED BY THE STRIKERS

Mayor Gives Evidence at Preliminary Trial of Strike Leaders.

ACCUSES AN ALDERMAN

Says Alderman Queen Declared Against Constituted Authority at City Hall.

WINNIPEG, July 28.—The city was practically in control of the strike committee from June 10 to 20, Mayor Charles P. Gray swore at the preliminary trial this afternoon of eight labor leaders for seditious conspiracy. The mayor occupied the witness box, all forenoon, and his examination in chief had not been completed when the court adjourned for lunch.

The salient points of his evidence were that the city was in control of the strike committee at certain times during the strike; that R. B. Russell, representing the metal trades council, had admitted early in the strike that the iron masters were willing to bargain on a collective basis; that Ald. John Queen, one of the defendants, had declared against constituted authority in committee meeting at the city hall.

His evidence also gave facts of conditions in Winnipeg under the strike regime. The mayor declared what led him to believe that the railwaymen in a conciliation board was that in an interview with W. D. Best, representing the running trades, Mr. Best had said that the railway running trades might walk out if a settlement was not reached.

Asked about police protection, the mayor said:

"I could not guarantee police protection as I would have liked after July 10, I had had many complaints of intimidation, and had not only been threatened myself, but actually assaulted."

He had spoken of this to representatives of the strike committee, whose answer was a threat to withdraw the police force altogether.

Ald. A. A. Heaps and John Queen, two of the defendants, were opposed to all attempts at carrying on the utilities during the strike. They actually called the members of the city council strike-breakers, he said.

"Ald. Queen was opposed to constituted authority, and it was very plain that his sympathies were not with the citizens," Mayor Gray swore.

DEATH PENALTY FOR BETRAYERS OF FRENCHMEN

Trial of "Laon Informers" Ends After Running Sixty Days.

DENOUNCED COMPATRIOTS

Two Women and Six Other Accused Condemned To Death.

PARIS, July 28.—Sentences were delivered this evening in the case known as the "Laon Informers" after a trial of more than sixty days. Of the twenty-eight persons accused eight were condemned to death, being of them being women; three others were condemned to death by default; six were acquitted and the remainder received sentences of from one to twenty years imprisonment.

The charge against the accused was denouncing compatriots to the German authorities during the occupation of Laon. In many cases the hiding places of French soldiers, who had escaped the German advance, were pointed out, with the result that a large number of the soldiers were executed.

Americans Caring For Thousands of Armenian Orphans

PARIS, July 28.—Twenty-eight orphanages have been established in the Armenian republic, according to a report on the situation there made public today. In the region of Erivan in Transcaucasia there were 15,000 orphans, and in Georgia 3,000 more, all of whom are maintained at the expense of the American relief association.

YORKSHIRE COAL SITUATION COMES TO A DEADLOCK

Men Believed Willing To Accept Offer of Government.

LONDON, July 28.—Late tonight the Yorkshire strike situation remained deadlocked. Neither side seemed willing to make the first move to bring the men and mine owners together to discuss the Government's offer of piece rates and adjust other differences. Both sides apparently are waiting for the coal controller to intervene. It is believed that the men are ready to accept the Government's offer, and that minor differences will not be difficult to adjust. It is estimated that the strike has already deprived the country of one million tons of coal.

Andrew Bonar Law, the government spokesman in the House of Commons, said he thought it would be impracticable to take a referendum on the question of the nationalization of coal. The miners have returned to work in the counties of Nottingham, Cheshire, Lancashire and Derbyshire.

TEACHERS GET INCREASE AT INGERSOLL FROM BOARD OF EDUCATION

INGERSOLL, July 28.—The board of education at a regular meeting tonight granted Miss Kendall, household science teacher, an increase of \$100. In future the salary will be \$1,000. Miss Middlemiss of Brantford, was engaged as kindergarten teacher, both morning and afternoon, at a salary of \$1,000 per annum.

Action is expected to be taken shortly by the council in regard to the request of the board for \$120,000 for the erection of the proposed Central School.

Start Plans at Chatham For a Strong Organization—Committee To Check Voters.

CHATHAM, July 28.—That there is considerable interest locally in the candidacy of R. L. Brackin as champion of the Liberal cause in West Kent, was manifested this evening at a large and enthusiastic meeting of his supporters, who met in the Oddfellows' auditorium.

Preliminary plans for a strong organization were completed after an explanation of the election act by Lieut. Edwin McDonald. His supporters appointed a strong committee for the purpose of checking the enumerators' list. Owing to the increase of the hour the candidate was not called upon for an address.

ATLANTIC SHIPPING STRIKE IS SETTLED AFTER THREE WEEKS

Agreement Is Reached With Marine Engineers On Wage Question.

NEW YORK, July 28.—The strike which for about three weeks has tied up shipping along the Atlantic seaboard was finally settled tonight when an agreement on wages was reached with the marine engineers. William S. Brown, national president of the engineers' union, immediately sent out orders to move ships without delay.

Under the agreement, reached tonight, chief engineers will receive a wage increase ranging from \$22.50 to \$100 a month, according to the class of ships, which gives them not more than \$25 a month less than masters. Assistant engineers gain from \$35 a month for first assistant engineers to \$10 for junior engineers and masters are granted, without any demand on their part, an increase of ten per cent.

The following increases per month were granted for the lower grade engineers and licensed dock officers: First officer and first assistant engineer, \$5; second officer and second assistant engineer, \$25; third officer and third assistant engineer, \$25; fourth officer and fourth engineer, \$15; junior engineers, \$10.

The engineers waived their claim for overtime pay, Frank D. Moore, chairman of the wage committee of the American Steamship Association, announced tonight.

WANTS NOT "OPEN" SUNDAYS, BUT KIND WORKERS CAN ENJOY

Windsor Liberty League Organizes For "Sane" Legislation.

WINDSOR, July 28.—Planning an active campaign among workers of Windsor and neighboring municipalities, officers of the Windsor and District Liberty League met tonight to organize canvassing and publicity committees.

Officers of the league declare it is not the intention of the organization to advocate an "open" Sunday, as alleged by some local pastors in sermons but to work for "sane legislation" that will permit, among other things, healthful recreation for workmen, who are unable to find time for it during six working days.

Membership of the league has now reached the 1,000 mark. It was announced, although many canvassers have not yet turned in their results.

KITCHENER PEOPLE NOW ABLE TO SEND MAIL TO GERMANY

KITCHENER, July 28.—The announcement here today that mail would be received at the local postoffice for Germany was received with much satisfaction by a number of citizens. Many of them have relatives living in Germany, with whom they have been unable to correspond during the entire period of the war. The local postoffice had about 400 inquiries from citizens regarding the sending of letters and parcels to Germany.

Mennonites Will Appeal Winnipeg School Act Cases

WINNIPEG, July 28.—Notice of appeal has been filed in the case of two Mennonite farmers from the Morden district who, along with nine other Mennonites, were convicted of a breach of the Manitoba school attendance act recently. By an arrangement between the counsel, the enforcement of the other nine convictions will be withheld until the appeal is settled one way or the other. It is understood that if the court of appeal in the province sustains the recent decision the two cases will be taken into the privy council, without a hearing before the supreme court of Canada.

Subsequently Sir George Foster stated that good progress had been made and the conference would be continued tomorrow.

HELP FARMERS AFFECTED BY CROP FAILURE

Scheme Agreed On Gives Free Freight Privileges on Hay, Cattle, Outfits.

EDMONTON, Alb., July 28.—The special hay and stock tariff for the relief of the farmers in the drought area goes into effect at once. Advice has been received from Ottawa that the Dominion Government will duplicate the concessions already agreed upon by the new railways will be operative. The scheme thus agreed upon gives the privilege of free freight on cattle, hay and hay outfits to bona fide farmers within districts affected by the crop failure. The Dominion and Provincial Governments will each pay half of the cost of moving cattle north for grazing.

Wildly scattered showers last night helped in some sections, but were not general enough to be of much aid.

IN INDIANA ALSO.

LAFAYETTE, Ind., July 28.—Corn throughout Indiana has been badly damaged the last few days by heat and lack of rain. Even a hard general rain in the next day or two could not offset all the damage. No estimate of the damage is available.

ITALY PREPARES TO LIFT EMBARGO ON GERMAN AND AUSTRIAN IMPORTATIONS

ROME, July 28.—The Italian Government is preparing a decree relating to the lifting of the embargo on German and Austrian importations. It will provide also for resumption of trade with Italy's former enemies.

FINDS EIGHT CATTLE CHARRED 'IN FIELDS; KILLED BY LIGHTNING

TEESWATER, July 28.—Eight head of cattle belonging to Foster Moffat were killed by lightning in a pasture field

near Holyrood a few nights ago. The loss is \$1,400. The cattle were all standing together near a fence when the bolt came. When discovered by their owner next day they were piled in an indescribable mass, burned and disfigured.
