

DOLLAR DAY IS HERE ONCE MORE TO AID YOU FIGHT THE H. C. OF L. GREAT DRIVE STARTS THURSDAY

Dollar Day—the day on which Mr. and Mrs. Housekeeper have their income is almost here! Since the last one which was held in February the consumer has been looking forward to this semi-annual event. Those who benefited by the bargain obtained on that day are planning to double the number of their purchases, while those who did not have an opportunity to share in the goods last winter are determined that they will not be among the missing when their neighbors armed with shopping equipment go out to take advantage of the bargain that the local merchants will give them.

Bona-Fide Bargains.
Nothing but bona-fide bargains will be offered. The London Retail Merchants' Dollar Day Association have seen to that. The object of the association is to make this day one on which the dollar will go farther than any other day in the year. This is made possible because the increased number of sales counterbalances the lesser profits on each article.

From every part of Western Ontario visitors come to London to share in the opportunities presented to the purchaser. For miles the roads are lined with autos and horse-drawn vehicles speeding to the city. When the merchant comes to open his store in the morning a crowd is waiting at his door. Many merchants make Dollar Day the biggest day of their business year.

Extra clerks are employed, and the store filled with goods. On the first dollar day of 1919 one merchant sold more goods than he ordinarily sold in a week.

"Unique Methods."
One local retailer has a unique way of showing that his bargains are bona-fide. Goods that have been advertised in his window for several days are left there on Dollar Day, but Dollar Day prices are substituted for the old ones.

From among the citizens of London a lady will be chosen as the mysterious Miss Dollar. All day long she will wander through the stores of the dealers who have Dollar Day signs in their windows. The person discovering her will be given a handsome cash prize. To keep everything lively a band will play on the main streets during the day. It will be taken about the city on a truck.

Especially is Thursday an opportune time for this great sale event. Summer is drawing to a close, and the retailer will soon have to handle stocks of autumn goods. To make room for these they must sell their summer articles at greatly-reduced prices. Those who purchase these goods will not regret it, for September and October months in which there are always several spells of hot weather. Meanwhile the merchants are clearing their decks for battle against old H. C. of L.

YANKEE FIRM OPENS BANK ACCOUNT HERE TO SOLVE EXCHANGE

To solve the problem of exchange between Canada and the United States by having American firms open bank accounts here is an idea advanced by Mr. George Wenige of the London Bicycle & Motor Sales Company.

Mr. Wenige's firm has been transacting business with a large American concern for some time, the yearly business averaging between \$20,000 and \$30,000. Prices were quoted in U. S. dollars, and the question of exchange was not mentioned. On payments being made, however, debit notes for exchange were sent to Mr. Wenige. The first few of these were paid, but when the payment on one shipment amounted to \$32 he refused to pay it.

After some argument the firm acknowledged the justice of his contention and withdrew the debit note. Similar proceedings were started again this year, but Mr. Wenige immediately protested. As a result of his vigorous protest, the firm opened a bank account in Toronto. Mr. Wenige's remittances for goods received are now sent to Springfield, where full credit is given for them and the checks are then sent to Toronto to be deposited. Other Western Ontario dealers are taking advantage of this plan, and as a result a large amount of Canadian money is kept in circulation here and is not otherwise sent out of the country.

Mr. Wenige thinks that other American firms might be induced to try the plan.

PRIVATE ARNOLD PRINCE LIKED BADLY TREATED RECEPTION AT IN BOSCHE CAMP ST. JOHN, N. B.

Was For Twelve Months a Prisoner of Germans.

After a period of twelve long months in a German prison camp, Pte. J. L. V. Arnold of the 15th Battalion, has arrived at his home at 129 Clarence street, accompanied by his English bride. When interviewed today, he said: "I certainly am glad to get home again. I have been in all of the chief European countries, but my travels only convinced me that there is no place in the world to equal my own dear country."

Pte. Arnold enlisted in the 142nd Battalion and left Canada with that unit, but overseas he was sent to the 15th Battalion with a draft of other men. In France, he was reported wounded and missing on November 11, 1917, and when his relatives received the official communication, it was believed that he had been killed. A few months later, however, the news reached Pte. Arnold's home that he had been taken prisoner and sent to a German hospital. After being released from hospital, he was sent to a prison camp until the armistice was signed.

Badly Treated.
"The treatment I received while in Bosche hands was terrible," stated the returned man to an advertiser reporter. "I was sent from the hospital before I was really fit, and put to work in the detention camp. It was hard work, too, for I had to shovel coal for 12 hours every day, Sundays included. They did not give me enough food to keep a bird alive, and the stuff I did get was not fit for a dog to eat. The daily menu consisted of mangle soup or bone-meat soup and coffee which was made from burnt barley and acorns. I shall never forget that coffee. It tasted like ground hay and water. Then the other item at each meal was called bread."

"The beastly Hunns would not even allow me to keep my boots. They snatched them for a pair of wooden clogs, with two pieces of cloth a foot and a half long and the ends of the clogs were treated in this way. So you see, the fact that I am so pleased to be home once more is quite easily understood."

DIFFERENT OPINIONS AS TO THE VALUE OF THOSE TRACTORS

Can't Do Work Like Horses, Say Teamsters.

Tractors which are being tested as a means of replacing teams in the city's construction work were tried out in sand-pits yesterday. There are two versions as to their performance. The teamsters say the tractors are unable to haul even one load of sand from the bottom of a sand-pit, and the old-fashioned horses had to be called in to draw the wagons to the street level. However, the tractors came into their own again and were able to take care of two or three loads of sand. Teamsters who have been watching the tests with some interest take this as an indication that the tractors can not satisfactorily replace teams. City Engineer Brazier states that they are being used in the city's streets. He thinks that if a team can be used in the sand-pits to draw the load, the street a great saving can still be effected by the tractors in making long runs to the sand-pits. 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
