

NEW WORLD'S RECORD MADE BY PRECEPTOR

Two-Year-Old Steps Four and a Half Furlongs at Belmont Park in 51 Seconds Flat

NEW YORK, May 19.—A new world's record was made at Belmont Park to-day, when Preceptor, a 2-year-old, carrying 113 pounds, won the second race at 4½ furlongs, straightaway. He stepped the distance in 51 seconds flat, which is three-tenths of a second faster than the best previous time, made by Tanya, a 2-year-old, with 107 pounds, at Belmont Park on May 12, 1904. There was a strong wind blowing down the stretch and the youngsters had it behind them all three ways. Preceptor was in front all the way, but was forced to a drive to stall off Seafarer, who was carrying the heavy impost of 137 pounds, won the Crotona Handicap, six furlongs, straightaway, in the record-making last time of 1:22½, which is three-fifths of a second slower than the world's record, which was made by Art-fist, with 130 pounds up, at Morris Park in 1904. Jack Atkin was pacesetter from the start, but was driving at the end to win.

A track record was broken in the first race, when Queen Marguerite ran the distance of five and a half furlongs in 1:04.

Penarris, favorite in the steeplechase, and which fell at the third jump, broke his leg and was immediately destroyed. The race was won by the second choice, King Castle, with Mark Gumberts second and Jim McGill third. Three horses fell in the race.
