CANADIANS INTERESTED IN BIG MINING PROJECT

Half Million Dollars Already Spent on Development at Conrad City.

VANCOUVER, June 27.—(Special.)—Col. Conrad, the American capitalist, who controls very large mining interests in the vicinity of Conrad City, arrived in the city from New York yesterday and will sail north on Sunday.

Col. Conrad also owns five and a half miles of placer ground on the Porcupine near Haines, Alaska, and it is his intention to install there, this summer, a hydraulic plant valued at \$600,000.
