No one is sorry to see Ottawa College win the senior intercollegiate Rugby championship. It is in the interest of sport that a champion be passed around. At the end of last season it was prophesied that College would have a winning combination this year, and the prophecy has held good.

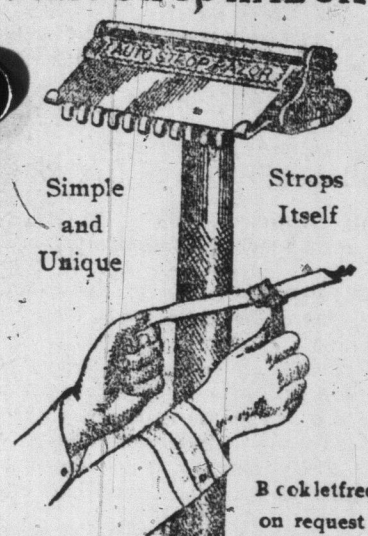

IMPORTANT BASEBALL RULING.

CINCINNATI, Nov. 17.—To prevent the continuous violation of the rule prohibiting farming of players, the national baseball commission yesterday announced that rule 20 of the national agreement had been entirely changed. The new rule adopted reads in part: "Rule 20—No sale of minor league player by one minor league club to another or to a major league club, shall be permitted within ten days of the first drafting day of each year, and whenever a minor league player is sold by one minor league club to another, such player shall be required to report to the purchasing club within three days after his sale."

"All sales of minor league players shall be reported to the national commission at least five days before the first drafting day of each year."

On the motion of Mr. Robertson, Frank Nelson was re-elected O.H.A. representative on the board of governors of the C.A.A.U.

A. W. Edwards of Galt gave notice of motion that the O.H.A. should have a club of ice hockey players, and that all clubs should have prepared and sent to the secretary a complete membership list.

The application for reinstatement, made by Lieut. A. F. Constantine and Bert Brown, was ruled out of order by the president.

Mr. John Ross Robertson was elected a life member of the association. The delegates gave three rousing cheers for Mr. Robertson, and sang "For He's a Jolly Good Fellow" with hearty good will.

Secretary W. A. Hewitt was voted the usual honorarium of \$400, and Treasurer Mr. McPherson \$50. J. P. Fitzgibbon, acting secretary last year, was elected Mr. Hewitt's successor.
