

# **AGINCOURT WANTS** IMPROVED SERVICE

Growth of Village Demands Better Railway Accommodation.

### EARLY MORNING TRAIN

First Does Not Leave for Toronto Until Ten-To Further Movement.

Out in the Village of Agincourt they are taking up the matter of improved suburban railway service which is bound to follow the completion of the new C. P.R. uptown station in North Toronto, with the greatest enthusiasm and interest. The great need for improved railway service in Agincourt has long been felt in that rapidly growing village, and The World's story of Wednesday morning has set them thinking harder than ever.

What the people of the village want is that one of these local trains shall be replaced by an earlier one preferably at 7.45 a.m.

But the big solution as the farmers and villagers of all that rich farming and dairy district see it, between the city and Agincourt, Whitby and Oshawa on the east, and the city and Streetsville on the west, is the inauguration of a suburban service running into the new terminal at North Toronto.




