

NEW YORK PARADE GREAT SPECTACLE

Men of All Classes in Greatest Civic Parade Known to United States.

countless hordes of men and women, representing all walks of life in the nation's metropolis, marched for two days and nights abreast, behind bands playing popular tunes. The crowded, decked streets lined with hundreds of thousands of cheering spectators. All eyes were turned to the floats that made up the complex life of the city that represented. Two hundred bands followed the music.

One in three were the street sweeper in their uniforms of white, while in another were the dignified and stately members of the City of New York. There also were the nearly 200, representing every denomination in the nation's greatest city, who, in this day of religious intolerance, veterans of the Spanish-American war—all were in line. "This," declared Major-General Leonard Wood, in command of the department of the east, who reviewed the parade, "is the greatest achievement of the army."

The great civic army began marching at 9.30 and the last of them had not passed the reviewing stand in Madison Square until 9.40 o'clock in the evening. The mammoth pageant began auspiciously. Just as Mayor Mitchell and a party of municipal officials left the city hall at the head of the first division an aeroplane appeared above Lower Broadway and hovered around the great skyscraper.

Remarkable Demonstration.

The paraders marched rapidly, more than 10,000 passing a given point with

in an hour. When the first division disbanded, after walking the full length of lower Fifth avenue to 57th street, the mayor, accompanied by Gen. Wood and Read-Admiral Nathaniel Usher, in command of the New York Navy Yard, left their carriages and took seats in the reviewing stand. Gov. With few exceptions, the marchers carried small American flags and buttonhole emblems.
