One of the most charming and interesting little names in the feminine category is Sidonie, heroine of novels beyond number, and yet quite commonly in every-day usage. Sidonie is another of the names which are derived from places and means "of the city of Sidon."

Curious, Sidonia is the feminine of one of the most famous masculine names of Roman history. Her predecessor was Caius Sollius Appolinarisyes, actually—Sidonius. He was said to be the most curious character of the dark ages, a literary and married bishop of Ciermont, in the fifth century, who, the possessing a reputation for extreme plety, was vasily different from the customary conception of ecclesiastical sanctity.

This good man has been canonized by the church and the twenty-third of August has been set aside as his feast day. His only namesakes have been women. France first evolved a Bidonia, which is still extremely popular there. Then came Sidonia as a Spanish product. The daughter of George Podiebrand of Silesia was Sidonia, also called Zedena. As early as 1488 Sidonia was in vogue in Germany.

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PROPOSE TO BUILD TUNNEL TO ISLAND

Toronto Must Not Be Too Optimistic, Federal Minister Declares.

A proposal has been submitted to the federal minister of public works to build a tunnel to the island under the western gap instead of a bridge to stiminate the heavy maintenance charges connected with movable bridges, and an engineer has been detailed to make an inspection of traffic tunnels in New York for the government's information.

This information came in a letter to Mayor Church respendent with the fundament.

Mayor Church yesterday, with the further intimation that money for either a bridge or a tunnel might not be available next year.

"I duly received you rfavor of the 24th untimo, with regard to the proposed bridges over the eastern and western gaps, Toronto harbor, and note the representations contained in your letter. As you state, these bridges form part of the general scheme of lake front improvments at Toronto approved by order-in-council, but there is no appropriation available for proceeding with either of the structures at the present time. The engineering branch are just now engaged in a study of the design and character of the proposed bridge over the western gap in order that the matter may be got in shape for consideration by the government. However, I would not like to encourage the city of Toronto to be too optimistic that financial conditions will permit of including in next year's estimates so

Because so many unexpected calls were made upon him, Dr. Grenfell was unable to give a detailed technical lecture last night to the audience of doctors and students at the Academy of Medicine, but nevertheless the slides and moving pictures lost none of their interest and educational value.

The troubles with which the doctor and his staff had to contend were mainly diatetic. Scurvy was becoming a thing of the past, Beri-beri a disease attended by slight paralysis, was paued by mainutrition, and was being successfully deadt with because the people were being taught how to cook and maintain a higher standard of liying, but it was very difficult to impress upon them the importance of the different food values.
