

CLAIMS BOOK PRINT BRINGS HIGH PROFIT

Paper Controller Sees No Reason for Holding Further Investigation.

That the manufacturers' profits on book print have increased over 400 per cent. was the statement made by Glyn Osler, counsel for Canadian publishers, before R. A. Fringle, K.C., paper controller, at a session held at parliament buildings yesterday. Although he admitted that the news print and

The session resolved itself into an effort by Mr. Osler to have the investigation into the Toronto Paper Manufacturing Company reopened. This Mr. Pringle refused to do, until further evidence of any advantage from such a course was shown. His accountants, he stated, had reported that nothing would be gained in the book print situation by investigation into the Toronto Paper Company.

"Like Lloyd George and Bonar Law," stated Mr. Pringle, "the government is anxious to terminate state control as soon as possible, and get back to normal. Were it not for the scarcity of news print, which has resulted in a very critical situation for Canadian newspapers, I think this

Canadian newspapers, I think the commission's work would already have been concluded."
