UNITED STATES.

DOMESTIC EXPORTS OF THE UNITED STATES.
—The report of the Secretary of the Treasury for
the fiscal year ending June 30th, 1851, has not yet
been published, but we have been furnished by a
correspondent at Washington with an account of
the value of articles exported, being of the growth,
produce, or manufacture of the United States,
during the fiscal year, from which we give the fol-

lowing summary:

The Sea.—Dried cod, \$307,729; pickled fish
(herrings, shad, salmon, mackerel, &c.), \$114,332;
wheat and fish oil, \$883,455; sperm oil, \$1,014,
907; whale bone, \$680,624; spermaceti candles,
\$195,916. Total fisheries, \$3,294,691.

The Forest.—Skins and furs, \$977,092; ginseng,
\$100,540; staves, shingles, &c., \$114,332;
\$2,348,691; other lumber, \$305,490; masts and
spars, \$70,095; oak bark and other, \$2,076,353;
\$35,477; all manufactures of wood, \$2,076,353;
rice, pitch, resin and turpentine, \$1,003,512; and
potash, \$949,091. Total forest, \$7,217,042.

Agriculture.—The total value of agricultural
products is not less than \$145,003,778. Of this
large amount, cotton is valued at \$7,231,280;
the export of that article only being valued at
\$112,315,317. The amount of vegetable food ex-
ported is \$16,857,884; the flour alone being up-
wards of ten and a half millions of dollars. The
value of the pork exported is \$1,919,000; of rice,
\$2,170,900; of tobacco, \$2,912,250.

Manufactures.—The whole value of manufac-
tured articles exported is \$34,180,868. The cotton
piece goods sent abroad are valued at \$7,231,280;
but the most material article under this is gold and
silver coin, the value of which is stated at \$1,269,
580. Deducting the bullion, the value of manu-
factures exported is \$27,919,288, or only an
amount much less than generally supposed.

The miscellaneous articles exported amount to
millions of dollars nearly; and the grand total
of all domestic exports for the year is \$145,003,
718. The exports for the previous year (ending June
30th, 1850), amounted to \$132,693,955; conse-
quently the increase in the latter year was no less
than \$12,309,763. This increase is chiefly attrib-
uted to the high price of cotton, and the large
quantities of California gold sent from
America to England, which together are supposed
to account for nearly the whole increase.

GLoucester Fisheries.—The Gloucester Tele-
graph has a review of the fishing business from
that port for the year 1851. The value of the
herring taken into Gloucester this year, is about
\$60,000.

The codfishing, which is carried on almost
entirely on Georges, Quers, and Green Banks, has
produced 45,000 quintals at Gloucester this year,
which brought a gross income of about \$130,000.

The high prices this year giving, a rise in the
value of the fish, the Gloucester fishery has been
extremely successful. The Gulf of St. Lawrence
mackerel fishery has also been successful this
season. About 300 Gloucester vessels were
engaged in it, and the quantity of mackerel pack-
ed at that port this year is about 70,000 barrels,
which at an average price of \$6 per barrel, affords
a gross income of \$420,000. This is divided
among some 3000 persons, and pays about \$150 a
man. Six vessels were lost from Gloucester this
year, and the crews of two of them. The losses
of the whole fleet are estimated at \$25,000.

Kossuth's Visit to Henry Clay.—Washington,
Jan. 9, 1852.—A most interesting interview
between Governor Kossuth and Henry Clay took
place this day, at half past two o'clock, at the
apartments of the latter. Kossuth was introduced
by Senator Cass. Mr. Clay received him standing
and then, being seated, he gave of his feelings
concerning the Hungarian revolution, and the
speech of half an hour in length, frankly ex-
pressing his opinions.—He deprecated the policy of
intervention as the greatest calamity which could
befall this country; and said that, as the posses-
sion of the only existing republic, the example of
man's capacity for self-government, which might
be destroyed by foreign wars, involving in their
fall all hopes of free institutions. These were, he
said, the sentiments of a dying man who had
been freed from.

Kossuth replied. He did not combat Mr. Clay's
positions, but confined himself to the prospects of
Hungary and the situation of France.

At parting, Mr. Clay rose and bade Kossuth
farewell forever. Kossuth then, after a short
Hungarian independence as the reward of the
labors of his people. Kossuth responded with
emotion.

Kossuth's Departure from Washington.
—Kossuth's departure is deeply regretted by the

Another Disastrous Accident in New York.—At 9 o'clock on Monday evening, a false
alarm of fire was raised at an old five-story build-
ing in New York, No. 140 Centre street, occupied
by the Commissioner for lodging of emigrants, to
the number of 300.

When the alarm was given the inmates rushed
for the doors and, on the stairs, similar to
the Allen Green street school, many of the
beings were thrown into a "hazy" mass of human
crowd above still pressed down upon the mass be-
low, crushing and smothering those who had first
fallen.

The police made great efforts to extricate those
who were wedged between the walls; but before
the passage could be cleared six persons were
smothered to death.

The building in which the casualty occurred is
five or six stories in height, twenty feet front, by
fourty feet deep, and is said to have been con-
structed under the direction of the Commissioners of
Emigration. The structure itself appears to be of
strong and substantial, but the stair-railing is
slight—about six feet of it gave way, but did not
however make the calamity worse than it would
have been.

The Coroner is busy in investigating the fearful
calamity which occurred in Centre street last night.
There were 450 emigrants in the building at that
time. None of the emigrants were furnished with
employment for the last two weeks, and the im-
migration Commissioners were run down with ap-
plications for lodgings, which accounts for the vast
number that were stowed away in the building.
The injured persons are doing well and it is thought
that they will all recover.

NEW ORLEANS, Jan. 11.—The stock of cotton
on hand is 130,000 bales. Receipts at all the
Southern ports about last year, 66,000 bales.

NEW ORLEANS.—The population of the city of
New Orleans, according to the census of 1850, is
16,497, of whom 17,000 are slaves.

The Largest Cargo of Cotton.—The ship *Good*
Washington, 1844 tons, of Boston, cleared at New
Orleans 27th ult. for Liverpool, with a cargo of
5501 bales cotton, weighing 2,400,000 lbs. It was
loaded in New Orleans at \$166,440. The *Good* W.
was loaded in 17 working days. This is the lar-
gest cargo ever shipped from any port in the United
States, or, probably, in the world.

COMMERCIAL LAKE.—The business of the
lakes will be great the coming season, beyond
precedent. Such an amount of produce is in re-
quest at the West that it will require every vessel
which can do to bring it down.—(Owego Journal.)

SAVANNAH, January 11, 1852.—Explosion of
the steamer *Anglo-Great Loss of Life.*—The
boat of the steamer *Anglo-Great*, Capt. McNelly,
explored at St. Simon Island, on Friday afternoon,
Captain McNelly, Thomas Conly, and eleven
other persons, belonging to the boat, were killed,
and eleven other persons injured. All of the pas-
sengers were saved. The whole of the forward
part of the boat was blown off, and she sunk in
ten minutes.
