Rangeley, Me., July 18—Justice Charles E. Hughes has refused the application for a writ of error to the United States Supreme Court made by W. Bourke Cockran, counsel for Charles Becker of New York. Becker has been condemned to die in the week of July 26 for the murder of Herman Rosenthal, while a patient there.

The application was denied upon the ground that there was no substantial federal question.

Cockran came here to plead Becker's case, and a hearing was given him at Justice Hughes' summer home.

It is understood that the writ alleged that Becker's constitutional rights had been violated in the conduct of his second trial for the murder of the gambler, Herman Rosenthal.

Mr. Cockran left for home without having made any statement regarding his mission, and nothing of the procedure was made known beyond the following announcement:

"Application was made to Justice Hughes for a writ of error in the case of Charles Becker, and was denied upon the ground that there was no substantial federal question."
