COOK ADMITS DEFEAT IN BRITISH STRIKE

SAYS MINERS GO BACK BEATEN BY STARVATION

Federation Secretary Denounces Baldwin as Owners' Tool

LONDON SPEECH

Attacks Trades Council for Failure to Provide Funds and Embargo

LONDON, Sept. 30.—The first admission from A. J. Cook, secretary of the Miners' Federation, of defeat of the British miners in the coal strike, came last night when he declared in an address before the tobacco workers union that the miners were going back to the pits "beaten by starvation."

"They have fought courageously, but they will be just as courageous in their retreat," he said. His denunciation of Mr. Baldwin as a tool of the coal owners and took a fling at the general council of the Trades Union Congress for failing to furnish money to aid the miners and for refusing to grant a coal embargo.

COMMUNISTS JAILED

Two charging a leaflet "calculated to disrupt the distribution of coal," D. F. Spinghall, a communist, was sentenced to three months in jail yesterday under the government's new powers act, which was renewed by the parliament Tuesday.

BUILDING PERMITS OF \$26,000 VALUE

New Structures in City During September—Dwelling, Garage Extension, Warehouse

There was an increase in the value of new buildings for which permits were granted in September this year, as compared with the same month of 1925, but the figures for the year to date are much below those of 1925.

WILL PAY IN CASH

Dominion Loan of \$35,000,000 Matures Next Friday

OTTAWA, Sept. 30.—The Dominion of Canada loan amounting to \$35,000,000 and maturing next Friday, will be paid in cash. Payment will be made at any of the assistant receiver-general's offices. The loan in question consisted of four per cent. two year notes issued in 1924.

Dempsey Asks Law Actions Be Stopped

NEW YORK, Sept. 30.—Suit to restrain Jack Kearns from pressing actions against him, was started in United States District Court yesterday by attorneys for Jack Dempsey, former heavyweight champion. Dempsey's attorneys allege that a "multiplicity" of suits in New York, Philadelphia and New Jersey are based on one cause of action, an alleged contract, "the existence of which Dempsey does not admit." The suits cited are one for \$838,888.88 and another for \$250,000 brought in New York state; one in Chancery in New Jersey, and another in Philadelphia.

BOXER IS HELD

NEW YORK, Sept. 30.—Frank Liberman, 19, was arrested today on a technical charge of homicide resulting from the death of Joseph Gerrity, 18, whom Liberman floored in the fourth round of an amateur boxing contest last night. Liberman, dated over his victory, leaped from the ring and went home unaware that his opponent was mortally hurt.

Cold Currents Drive French Sardines Far Out To Sea

Fine Lobsters Found Off Erin

BOULOGNE, France, Sept. 30.—The French marine research vessel La Tanche has just found out why sardines leave home. The problem had been bothering French fishermen and sardine packers for several years. The cause has been traced to cold currents coming down the coast, which are now being driven south by the wind. The fish no longer move in great schools along the French coast. The research workers found that cold currents have come into the one rich sardine beds and have driven them farther out to sea, where the French fishing fleet, at greater risk, is now hunting them in by net boats. The government vessel also chartered hitherto unknown fishing grounds in the North Sea and off the Irish coast, once considered barren and dangerous because covered with coral but now known to be the breeding ground of the choicest lobsters.

Child Is Born With Heart On Outside of Body

BROCKVILLE, Ont., Sept. 30.—Travelers from Saranac Lake, N. Y., arriving here today state that yesterday in the general hospital there, a child was born with its heart on the outside of its body. The organ was placed on the top of the chest and in the center.

MUNSEY PAPERS ARE BOUGHT BY DEWART

Sun and Telegram Purchased From Metropolitan Art Museum

NEW YORK, Sept. 30.—The New York Sun and the New York Evening Telegram have been bought from the Metropolitan Museum of Art, the real-estate legatee of the late Frank Munsey, by Wm. T. Dewart, president of the Munsey Companies.

NO CHANGE IN PLAN

Rumanian Queen to Leave Saturday on Way Here

BUCHAREST, Rumania, Sept. 30.—Persistent rumors published abroad to the effect that differences in the Royal Family would prevent Queen Marie's trip to Canada and the United States, met with positive denial today from a most authoritative source in the Rumanian court. The queen and her party, it was stated, will leave Bucharest Saturday for Paris, sailing from Cherbourg October 12, on the Lorient, as originally announced.

AGED COUPLE KILLED

Car Struck by C. P. R. Train at Level Crossing

COOKSVILLE, Ont., Sept. 30.—When the closed car they were driving was struck by the Canadian Pacific Railway's Chicago flyer at a level crossing, last night, Charles Gifford, 70, and his wife, Fannie, 60, of Buffalo, N. Y., were instantly killed. The automobile, according to witnesses, appeared to pass deliberately two other cars which had stopped because of the approaching train. The car was thrown into the ditch, where it took fire. Gifford was picked up on the road, but his wife had to be extricated from the wrecked car.

Missionary Secretary Is Killed in Japan

TORONTO, Ont., Sept. 30.—Rev. D. Hatano, General Secretary of the Mission Board of the Japan Methodist Church, has been killed in a train wreck near Tokyo, according to word received here. Mr. Hatano was in Canada as delegate to the general conference which met at Ottawa in 1914.

Were Entombed 800 Feet Underground Since Last Friday

ALL IN HOSPITAL

Light Foods Replace Birch Bark Diet; Rescues Greatest in History

IRONWOOD, Mich., Sept. 30.—Safe after 121 hours of nerve racking imprisonment in the damp depths of the Faber Iron Mine, 800-foot-deep, which saw daylight from hospital beds today for the first time in almost a week.

TRIAL ON, DESPITE INQUEST VERDICT

Alphonse Smith to Face Murder Charge, Though Cleared by Jury

WHITESTABLE, Eng., Sept. 30.—The finding of the coroner's jury which investigated the death of John Thomas Derham, who was killed August 12, in a quarrel with Alphonse F. A. Smith at Smith's villa, Stella Maria, at this place, will affect the trial of Smith, on a murder charge, at the Maidstone Assizes two weeks hence. The coroner's jury found that insufficient evidence had been adduced to show who fired the shot and whether it was accidental or otherwise. Smith is a grandson of the late Hugh Ryan, one of the builders of the Canadian Pacific Railway.

EULER WILL PROBE

New Customs Minister Says no Time For Talk

KITCHENER, Ont., Sept. 30.—"First find out as completely as possible what is wrong, and then apply the remedy," is what W. D. Euler, newly appointed Minister of Customs in the King Government, is going to do when he takes up his duties at Ottawa, he said yesterday. "That's all that could be expected from a man in my position just now," he added. "This is not the time to talk but to act."

Section's Faith In His Generalship Is Stressed

POOLEY AGREES

Present House Chief Would Step Down to Make Way for Ex-Premier

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VANCOUVER, Sept. 30.—The Vancouver Province published the following in its news columns yesterday:

"Following the announcement that Right Hon. Arthur Meighen, upon his retirement from the arena of Federal politics, might come to live in British Columbia, local Conservatives are discussing the possibility of his accepting the leadership of the party in this province."

"It is an idea that is meeting with enthusiastic reception among leaders of the party, who say that British Columbia demonstrated in no uncertain terms, her faith in the man and his policies and now a further demonstration of regard for British Columbia Conservatives, in the form of the highest gift in their power, is considered to be most appropriate in the event of his assuming the leadership of this province."

ADVANTAGE SEEN

"It is also urged that Mr. Meighen's entry into the public life of one of the Dominion's most richly endowed provinces, would be in the nature of a national gesture for being possessed of a grasp upon conditions from Victoria to Halifax his influence would be of paramount value in bringing about a closer unity between east and west, and a better understanding between the different portions of Canada."
