

dried up the forests was continuing, and that there was no rain in sight.



ONDON, May 18-The future of David Lloyd George as the leader of the Liberals in the House of Commons is hanging in the balance, British United Press learns from inside sources today.

While he has not actually threat-ened to resign it is known that Lloyd George is highly dissatisfied with the attitude of his party toward the strike. He feels that a great opportunity for the revival of Liberalism has been lost the revival of Liberalism has been lost and that the Conservatives have been allowed to get all the credit for de-feating the strike and promoting a mu-tually satisfactory settlement. As a result the Conservatives are stronger now than they ever have been
