

## DRIVER AVERTS TRAIN MISHAP

Connecting Rod on Ocean Limited Breaks Near Paines Jct.

BUT for the care of the driver of the locomotive on the westbound Ocean Limited on the C. N. R., as the train approached Paines Junction, about 8 miles east of Moncton, yesterday afternoon, a serious accident might have occurred. The crack passenger express was speeding along at a rate of about 40 miles per hour when the driver heard a clanking on the side of the engine. He pulled up the train and it was then found that one of the connecting rods on the locomotive had broken, and the free portion of the rod had been smashing into the ties and the roadbed at each revolution of the driving wheel. The train limped into Paines Junction station and word was sent to Moncton from where a new locomotive was sent to the scene to bring in the disabled train. The express eventually arrived in Moncton about half an hour late. Had the break in the rod been such as to leave a longer portion free, it might easily have derailed the locomotive.

### HEAVY TRAFFIC

The Halifax train, due at the Union Depot at 6.50 o'clock Daylight time, was about half an hour late in arriving last night owing to exceptionally heavy traffic between Halifax and Moncton. The outgoing Boston and Montreal trains were held up for some time last night both on account of this and the late arrival of the steamer Empress from Digby. The Empress was one hour and 20 minutes late owing to tardy train connections at Digby.




### MONEY IN PIGEONS

Frank H. Hollman, Chautauqua Lecturer Here, Tells About Buds

How one man last year made \$6,000 profit from 3,000 pairs of pigeons. A 10-acre plot of land was related before a large and greatly interested audience in the Chautauque tent yesterday afternoon by Frank H. Hollman, editor of the American Pigeon Journal, and eminent authority on pigeon raising, who exhibited 28 different varieties of the birds, explaining the peculiarities of each and telling many interesting things about pigeons in general.

In the evening there was an even larger attendance and the audience was treated to a program of exceptional merit from the Zedler symphonic string quartette, Nicholas Zedler, famous cellist, was the leader of the quartette of artists. When the first service was held in the church on Sunday last Father Lochary highly complimented the contractor, C. W. Bowlin, on the completion of the work in such splendid fashion. Tomorrow night Bishop LeBlanc is to administer the sacrament of confirmation in the church to a large class.

## NEWCASTLE BOY, 14, IS DROWNED

John Fenelon Goes Under While Swimming Towards Shore; Body Missing

NEWCASTLE, July 5.—John Fenelon, 14 year old son of William Fenelon, who resides a short distance from Newcastle, was the victim of a drowning fatality tonight when he fell off a catamaran near the Drummond Docks and, although able to swim and having made a good start for the shore, sank and was lost. The body had not been recovered at midnight but the workers had not given up grappling for it and will carry on as long as there is any hope of its recovery.

The boy was an exceptionally bright and very well liked in the community. With two companions, the Reid brothers, he had been hunting for wood and logs along the shore when the accident happened. The two other boys were on the shore at the time young Fenelon was out on the catamaran of planks overhanging the water. It is believed that he either fell or rolled off. He was making his way shorewards when he was seen to go under and before help could reach him he was lost.

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
