PUTS LOW VALUE ON INGLEWOOD

F. A. Barkhouse, Surveyor, Makes Figure Dollar an Acre

Arbitration Hearing is Adjourned to Resume in Saint John on Jan. 4

An estimate of \$1 per acre for the Inglewood tract was given yesterday afternoon by Frank A. Barkhouse, of Fredericton, land surveyor and cruiser and former employee of the New Brunswick Government, when he was on the stand in the hearing before Judge A. T. LeBlanc of the claim for damages of the Inglewood Pulp & Paper Co. Ltd., against the New Brunswick Electric Power Commission. The Inglewood tract includes about 41,000 acres and the part expropriated is said to be about 7,000 acres.

The hearing was adjourned yesterday afternoon to the afternoon of Jan. 4, 1926, the place of the adjourned session to be Saint John.

The session opened with S. R. Weston, chief engineer of the New Brunswick Electric Power Commission, still on the stand. He gave evidence of the possibility of putting flashboards in the dam spillways.

He told of calling for tenders in 1920 but declared that the contract was not let then. It was not until 1922 that the surveys were finished, he said.

In regard to Sherwood Lake, he said he had located the survey for a storage dam higher up the stream than the old dam because the height could not be obtained at the old site without long wings.

It would cost about \$1,000 a mile to construct a winter road to a power plant at that site, he said, and a summer road would cost two or three times as much. There were a great many granite boulders, he said.

Referring to the 1923 disaster, he declared there had been an extraordinary flood, the run-off into the Log Falls pond being about 11,500 cubic feet per second for one day and very nearly that on the second day.

He spoke of the small developments at Kouchibouguie, Shediac and Bathurst, declaring they were not financial successes.

He agreed that the 1924 report of the commission said they were keeping men on the dams at spring flood time to look after the gates.

David L. Hutchinson, director of the Dominion Meteorological Observatory, was called and placed in evidence precipitation records from 1874 to the present time.

Mr. Barkhouse said he was with the New Brunswick Railway Company at

a timber cruiser and land surveyor. He had formerly been with the Provincial Government. He had made an examination of the Inglewood property and the result was the Prince report in evidence.

He thought it would be at least 70 years before lumbering operations on the tract generally could be commenced. Asked to give his idea of the value of the tract, he said it was worth about \$1 an acre. He thought the Provincial Government's wild land tax was two cents an acre.

On cross-examination by Dr. F. R. Taylor, K. C., he said he thought it was true that lumber grew faster on the Bay of Fundy coast than in the northern parts of the province. He thought, however, that there would be only about a seven-inch average size in 50 years, as his report said. Answering a question as to whether or not he believed the site would be ten inches in that time, he said he did not.

G. H. Montgomery, K. C., of Montreal, Dr. F. R. Taylor, K. C., and Horace Porter represented the company and P. J. Hughes, K. C., of Fredericton, and J. D. Pollard, Lewin appeared for the commission.

Four days before his death he was given \$6,000 by a friend who had been holding it for him. Less than \$500 was found on his person. It is now believed that the man buried a large portion of his wealth and that additional sums may be discovered soon.

BOSTON, Dec. 4.—Reserve Officer John J. Minahan of the Malden police sent a bullet through the tonneau of his own automobile in an attempt to capture three bandits who had stolen the car from in front of his home, and had led him a merry chase through the streets, until he forced the car into a fence.

Minahan had heard the car start from in front of his house, and later located it, a block from the police station. Securing the police car, he gave chase and ran his quarry to ground after a mile race. When the stolen car crashed into the fence, Minahan stopped as soon as he could, but by that time the three men were making their getaway. He fired three shots to stop them, but only succeeded in putting a hole in his own car.

OLD CURSE HOLDS

No Male Heir Left to Fyvie Castle Owner Since 13th Century

LONDON, Dec. 4.—The old tradition that no owner of Fyvie Castle shall ever leave an heir has been strikingly verified in the case of Lord Leith of Fyvie. Lord Leith spent much time in America, grew immensely rich there, married an American girl and came back to Scotland to live in Fyvie Castle, the ancestral home.

An old "curse" laid against Fyvie Castle in the 13th century declared that no "heir of Fyvie" should ever leave a male heir to inherit.

The records show that this "curse" proved seemingly so potent that no owner of the castle since that day had a son or a grandson living at his death. The property always passed along the female line.

Lord Leith bade fair to smash this tradition. He had a son and a grandson, besides a daughter.

But both the son and grandson were killed in the war and when Lord Leith died at 78 there was only a daughter to inherit his property.

Stamps Worth \$35,000 Are Sold In London

LONDON, Dec. 1.—London has nothing like Miami real estate to pile up fortunes over night, but the "Mayfair find" shows how a small investment can multiply in value after a lapse of a few decades.

About 60 years ago a young English nobleman interested in stamp collecting began to specialise in the issues of British colonies. He wrote to postmasters in Canada, Ceylon and other possessions and secured many issues of stamps in whole sheets. Then he put them aside and apparently forgot about them. They were recently discovered in a Mayfair closet. They had cost the collector less than \$100 and they have been sold by the heirs for more than \$35,000.
