**GANG SPIRIT HELPS
IN IMPROVING BOYS**
How it is Capitalized to Build
Churches, is Shown by N.
Y. Children's Aid Society.

The extent to which the Children's Aid Society has been able to capitalize the gang spirit, reduce juvenile delinquency and build character among the thousands of boys with which it has to deal, was partly illustrated by the report of Secretary G. Loring Brace, at the annual meeting of the officers of that organization, says the New York Times. William Church Osborn was elected President of the society; Edwin G. Merrill, Treasurer, and Mr. Brace, re-elected Secretary. Thomas W. Lamont, Arthur C. Quinn-Jones, Mr. Osborn, Dr. Eugene H. Pool and William H. Wheelock were elected Trustees.

"Our aim is to capitalize the gang spirit," said the report. "The boy is a social being. He must have companionship. If the street corner and the sidewalk is his only playground, he will, in the nature of the case, fall in with that element which enables him to get money easily. One of the resultant achievements of our work is the reduction of juvenile delinquency. The policemen, the business men, the residents of the district in which the Newboys' and Kips Bay Houses are situated, comment upon the improvement of the neighborhood as the years have gone by."

Mr. Brace estimated that there were 800,000 boys between 8 and 18 in Manhattan offering a wide field for the society's activities. He said that apart from the public schools there was "no general city-wide plan for the development of character and physique for the boys," and that the benefits of home training should be supplemented by strong agencies for moral and physical growth and for recreation. He said that the number of boys coming here from foreign lands presented an increasing problem.

"During the past year," Mr. Brace said, "we have taken care of 2,487 homeless boys and girls in our shelters and 9,203 boys have been provided with recreation and intensive club work through our neighborhood clubs."

The Employment Bureau of the society found work for 2,104 boys during the year, the report showed, and the Boys' Club of the Children's Aid Society are reaching about 3,000 boys out of a combined boy population of 60,000 within a half-mile radius of the three club units. The report emphasized the craving of the normal boy for amusement which he will seek in commercialized public places unless provided with wholesome places to spend his surplus energy. The report continued: "There are in Manhattan more than 400 public dance halls, 1,000 pool rooms, 500 moving picture shows and scores of penny arcades. But few are conducted in a decent and orderly manner, and the arcade pictures are quite generally suggestive."

"It has been definitely proved that the sections where the lower grade amusements prevail, furnish the greater proportion of juvenile delinquents. On the other hand, the incoming of a Boys' Club or recreational centre into a particular district has immediately reduced juvenile delinquency and made a decided improvement in the character of the neighborhood."

The income of the society "applicable for current expenses," according to the report of the treasurer, Edwin G. Merrill, was \$607,428.52, which, with bequests, additions to trust funds, etc., brought the grand total up to \$1,145,282.73. The total current expenses were \$390,264.59, and some of the important items were: Department of schools for handicapped children, \$147,285.42; cost of welfare work, \$283,295.60; maintenance of summer charities, \$188,297.40.

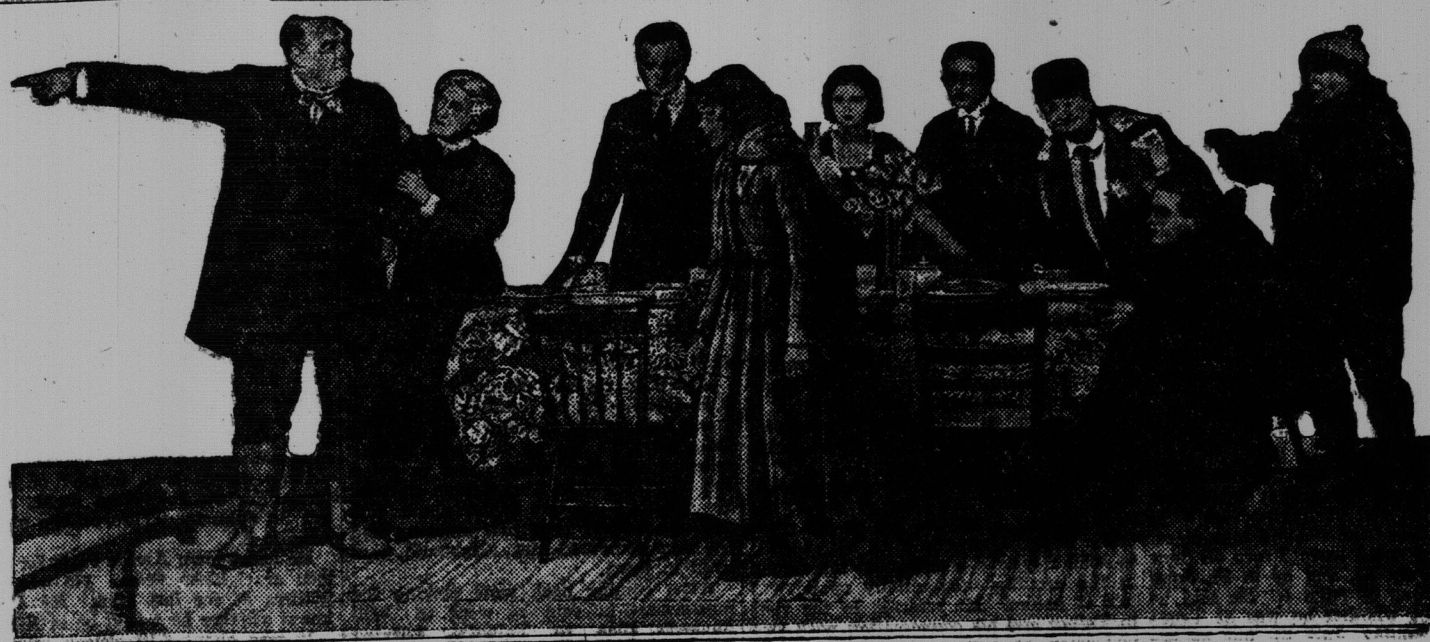

to dig up the art treasures of the buried cities of the Holy Land. Word has just come in this place. By the way, the excavations have had some extraordinary successes. Archaeologists are at present uncovering many splendid Greco-Roman buildings and statues throughout Judea, and some fine examples of ancient pottery. Most of the newly-found structures were probably erected by Herod the Great, famous as the slayer of his beautiful wife, Mariamne, and as the slaughterer of the innocents at the time of the birth of Christ.

The greatest finds thus far undoubtedly have been made on the site of the renowned old city of Ascalon, on the Mediterranean. Here a party of excavators has discovered the intricate system of cloisters which once included the wonderful court of Herod in this place. By patient digging and clearing away of the debris the searchers have succeeded already in unearthing several enormous and valuable statues, including figures of the gods Apollo, Venus and Victory, and a colossal representation of Herod himself. This great discovery has followed directly upon the earlier unearthing, in the same place, of a temple with
