ELIMINATE RACE.

Fredericton, N. B., Jan. 19.—By a vote of three to two the clubs of the New Brunswick Hockey League have decided to eliminate the rule allowing substitutes to be used for players serving penalties. Referred have been notified that the change is effective immediately.

SKATING.
McGowan Defeats Baple.
St. Paul, Minn., Jan. 19.—Defeating Norval Baple of Philadelphia in four races here last night, Everett McGowan, St. Paul skater, won the right to meet other prominent skaters of the continent in an elimination series to determine the world's skating championship. McGowan, who won the international amateur skating championship last year, captured the 220 yard event in 29-1-3 seconds by three feet; the 440 yard in 39 seconds by a lap; the mile in 2 minutes, 55-8 seconds, by more than a yard; and the two mile in five minutes, 58-4-4 seconds by more than a year. On Sunday he defeated Baple in the 1-2 mile and three mile races.
