SAYS INTERVENTION BY ALLIES VITAL

London Paper's Correspondent De-
clares Russians Need Help from
Outside

London, June 28.—That the Bolshevik
in Siberia are weak and could be over-
thrown easily, but for the support of
armed prisoners released by them, is the
contention of the Harbin correspondent
of the Daily Mail. In a long despatch
dated Bern, June 28, he says that of 20,
000 prisoners fighting on the side of the
Bolsheviks in Trans-Baikali, 4,000 are
Magyars, who are the chief source of
Bolshevik strength. Two or three al-
lied divisions, says the correspondent,
could put down all opposition in Si-
beria.

HOUSE-BUILDING PLAN LAUNCHED IN GUELPH

Guelph, June 28.—A start has been
made to remedy what was fast becom-
ing a serious handicap to the business
men and manufacturers of Guelph. A
housing proposition that bids fair to be
successful has been presented to a com-
pany of leading business men, and steps
are under way today that will shortly
lead to a great revival in the building
trade. The proposal is to build fifty
houses at once of a kind that will be in
reach of tradesmen, which they can buy
any time at the exact cost price. Definite
arrangements have been made whereby
the work of building may commence at
once under the auspices of the Guelph
Home Builders' Association, and it is
expected that the coming summer will
see much activity in the building line.
Many of these houses need not cost more
than \$1,500, and for the semi-detached

French Navy Leads An Enchanted Life

Surprising the World by its Magnificen-
Achievements

Paris, June 28.—During a debate in
the Chamber of Deputies on provisional
appropriations, George Leygues, minister
of marine, in reply to questions concern-
ing the navy, said that the French navy
was an enchanted life, and was surpris-
ing the world at large by its magnifi-
cent achievements.

Real sea peril was in 1916, said
M. Leygues, but the Allied navies had
checked the submarine war. Soldiers
and foodstuffs were now pouring into
France. The Germans had boasted that
American armies would never approach
the French shores and bring victuals and
reinforcements to France. The Germans
came near fulfilling their dream, but
thanks to the immense efforts put for-
ward by the French navy, the German
plan had ended in failure.

Admiral Benaime, deputy for the
Seine, also gave praise to the French and
Allied navies. He said Germany's sub-
marine war was dead. Accidents might
still happen, he added, but German
piracy had been vanquished.

distance of 1,500 miles, and keep in

"Bolshevism is a living corpse, allied
intervention is vital, not only to save
the Russians from the Germans, but to
save the Russians themselves." The
correspondent then gives information
concerning conditions in prominent Siberian
towns. He says that there are 40,000
unarmed Austrian prisoners at Omsk,
where a German consul has just arrived.
The consul has received 250,000 rubles
from the local Bolshevik government as
an indemnity for the liquidation of Ger-
man business, while representatives of
British and American firms are being
molested heavily under the threat of im-
peachment.
