Will Jack Johnson and "Bomb" Wells be Permitted to Have Their Battle in French Capital?

W ILL Jack Johnson and Bombardier Wells, the British heavyweight champion, be permitted to fight for the title in Paris,
or any place in France after the manner in which the proposed contest was stopped in London a little less than two years ago?
It was the proposed contest between Wells and Johnson that stirred
up such a sensation in merry old England and came near putting a
quietus on the sport in a country that had for hundreds of years supported it. It was announced recently that Al. Palzer, a white hope,

Johnson may have trouble in getting over to the gay city, and then again Wells may hold out for such a big sum that it might take the breath away from the promoters in Paris. The fight which would really get the money for the promoters is a Wells-McCarthy clash. That would be a real white championship affair and it would attract more attention than any match that could be made at the present time. It would be a wonderful card in London, Paris, San Francisco or Los Angeles.

WOULD AFFECT SARDINE INDUSTRY IN EASTPORT


