## NOT THIS SEASON, SAYS PRESIDENT

No. G. T. P. Terminal Work at Present—Money Market Quoted by Mr. Chamberlain

Mr. Chamberlain's reply has been received as follows:

Dear Sir:—I have your favor of 7th inst. relative to the extension of the Grand Trunk Railway into St. John. I am unable to tell you at the present time when action will be taken in the matter, but probably not the present season. ## LOCAL NEWS

### POLICE REPORTS

### GET INCREASES

The Allan line have granted an advance of five shillings a month to their men and firemen employed on the Gramplan and Hesperian, since those vessels have been engaged in carrying mail between Glasgow and the St. Lawrence. The advance is in accordance with the custom of the mail service vessels which pay higher rates than others.

A pretty wedding was solemnized this morning in St. Peter's church, when Rev. E. J. Holland, C. S. R., united in marriage Miss Mary E. Harrington and Charles O'Neill, both of this city. ## TEN KILLED IN NEW YORK SUBWAY CONSTRUCTION

New York, June 16.—The body of John Green, a driller, was recovered early today from a pile of broken rock under which he and nine other fellow workers were buried in a cave-in on Saturday on the Lexington avenue subway now under construction. All ten bodies have now been recovered.

### Succeeded Ismay

London, June 16.—In consequence of the retirement of J. Bruce Ismay, Harold A. Sanderson, the first vice-president, becomes president of the International Mercantile Marine Company. P. E. Curry, Southampton, manager of the American line, has been appointed manager of the White Star Line at Southampton, not a director of the International Mercantile Marine, as previously reported.

## THE PROBLEM OF RAILWAY SIDINGS

Local Merchants Anxious to See Something Done at Once—Water Street Tracks

The problem of providing siding accommodation to replace the facilities which are being removed to make way for the sugar refinery plant is daily becoming more pressing. Not only is it said that the berths which have been used for loading lumber scows will be done away with, but the railway is losing the platforms which have been used for handling large quantities of local freight.

While the site for a new lumber wharf may present some difficulties, it is said that there is plenty space on the government property for the loading platforms and all that is required is their erection on the site which is being cleared. This would give accommodation for most of the local business, but this traffic is steadily growing and, in addition, there will be new business developing along Water street, where the new wholesale warehouses are being erected.

To provide for this new business as well as to make the handling of goods in this district more convenient the extension of the L. C. B. tracks along Water street is being urged upon the government.

At Ballast wharf there were formerly sidings and loading platforms at which eight cars could be handled at the same time. The removal of Shed No. 10 has done away with four of these and it is understood that Shed No. 11 is to be removed within the next six weeks and this will mean the loss of two more car berths, leaving only two instead of the original eight. In the past, it is said, there has been enough business to keep all eight occupied pretty steadily, and the present condition of affairs is declared to be causing considerable hardship to the merchants who depend on these sidings for delivery and shipment of their goods.

It is said that the remaining portion of the government land at that place provides sufficient room for the erection of new loading platforms to replace those which have been done away with, and the local merchants are anxious to see something done promptly by the L. C. B. officials in whose hands the minister of railways said on Saturday, the matter has been placed.

Something, they say, will have to be done also to provide new loading berths for the lumber scows. Kennedy slip has been used for this purpose for a long time and at present there is no other berth in the city which meets the requirements. What is needed is a wharf with a rail connection on the face of it and a mud slip on which the scows can rest at low water. A deep water slip is not suitable, as the distance from the top of the wharf to the scow would be too great to permit handling the deals at low tide.

## POLICE COURT

"From a moral stand-point," said Magistrate Ritchie, in dealing with a case against Chinese laundry owners in the North End, reported for working on Sunday, "I do not think that these men are any better than the men who will give liquor to the poor unfortunate men I see before me almost every morning." The complaint was against Sing Lee and Hum Foo. The former pleaded guilty, but said that he had to get the work done for a man who was in a hurry for his collar. Hum Foo denied the charge but another celestial appeared in court and said that he had delivered a few parcels for Hum Foo on Sunday. Sergeant Kilpatrick told of seeing the work done.

The magistrate, in commenting on the conditions in the North End, said that on Saturday afternoon while there was a large crowd in Main street, a man staggered past him using some very vile language. One of the Chinese remarked: "Certainly they should not act that way toward you."

The defendants were each fined \$8 or two months in jail, but the fine was allowed to stand on condition that they do no more Sunday work.

In the case of Herbert Spragg, on application of his counsel, E. S. Ritchie, the preliminary hearing was adjourned until Thursday afternoon at 2 o'clock.

One man, charged with drunkenness, was remanded and three more forfeited deposits of \$8 each.
