MORNING NEWS OVER THE WIRES

Captain Bernier, former commander of the government's steamer Arctic, left Quebec on Monday on the schooner Minnie Maud for a cruise in the Arctic Islands. He goes in search of gold mines, but would say little of his plans. He has a crew of seven men who were with him on previous trips and he said that he might be away two or three years.
The delegation consisting of the Quebec Board of Trade, the harbor commissioners and municipal authorities and leading citizens, are to meet the Hon. F. D. Monk, Minister of Public Works on his trip to Quebec today and urge the necessity of a dry dock at Quebec. The fact that the Empress of Britain recently in collision with a collier will have to go to England for permanent repairs will be referred to as an illustration.
Special Inspectors for the Provincial Board of Health, Quebec, have found in two municipalities, Indian Lorette and Jeanne Lorette, that health laws have been set at naught. Smallpox in these communities is raging in many homes, and people are walking about the streets in the first stages of the disease. The inspectors have warned the local authorities that steps must be taken at once in the matter and as a result measures are being adopted for controlling the situation.
The approximate estimate of the loss to the C. E. R. and the British & Canadian Steamship Company as a result of the collision of the S.S. Empress of Britain with the steamer Helvetia in the Gulf of St. Lawrence, is given at \$675,000.
Henry Webber and his father, of Lawrence, Mass., who are under arrest at Halifax charged with offences against bankruptcy, are still fighting extradition and refuse to go back to the states. The Webbers kept a shoe store in Lawrence and were indicted in June by the Federal Grand Jury. Judgment in the case will be given by Judge Wallace in Halifax today. H. Melish, K.C., is appearing for the Webbers, and W. J. O'Brien for the American government.
Paris, July 30.—The visit to Paris of the Canadian premier, Robert L. Borden, and other Canadian ministers closed tonight with a dinner given by the Franco-American committee in their honor. The dinner was presided over by Premier Poincare and Gabriel Hanotaux, president of the Hopeville Hill, July 30.—(Special)—Young Robertson, the twelve-year-old lad, who was sent up for trial on a charge of entering and stealing from a store in Albert, pleaded guilty today before Judge Jones, and was sentenced to fifteen days in the county jail.
New Glasgow, N. S., July 30.—(Special)—James McDonald, of Antigonish, a man of 26 years, was killed in the Allen mine shaft today. McDonald was working at the face when coal fell on him. He was brought to the surface unconscious and died while being taken to the Aberdeen hospital.
London, July 30.—Premier Asquith, denied in the house of commons this afternoon that the government proposes to frame a measure for a single tax on land.
July 30.—The house of commons tonight passed the second reading of the seal fisheries bill giving effect to the convention between Great Britain, United States, Russia, and Japan, to prevent the extermination of the seal in North Pacific.
