## NORWEGIAN GIRLS SING WELL

(St. Andrew's Beacon).

As fast as possible work is being pushed on the Chamcook sardine works. Good progress has been made lately on the industrial plant and the work people's dwelling, but there is still a great deal to be done.

The Norwegian girls find themselves in fairly comfortable circumstances in their temporary boarding house, but they are anxious to get down to work. Several of the girls were sent back to Norway last week, because they did not fit in, but those who remain are of a superior class, and when they get a chance will "make good."

On Friday night, a number of singers from the Presbyterian congregation, visited the Norwegian lodging house, and spent a pleasant hour. Several hymns were rendered in English and in the Norwegian language. The Norwegian girls have good voices and sing well together. Their rendering of several of their Norwegian hymns was a revelation to the local vocalists.

On Sunday evening another interesting choral service was held.

## RECENT DEATHS

The death of Mrs. Martha Loezer, aged ninety-six, occurred in Chatham on Sunday. Seven sons are left to mourn, three in Chatham and four in the United States and Western Canada.

In Chatham on Monday Miss Florence Whelan, fifth daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Joseph Whelan, died, aged seventeen years. Besides her parents she leaves four sisters and one brother.

## Secretary Anderson's Successor

St. Andrew's Beacon:—The St. John Board of Trade has lost a good official by the resignation of Secretary Anderson. He was a most intelligent and indefatigable worker in the city's interests, and to his energetic efforts is largely due the forward movement which is now taking place in the city. Not only St. John, but the whole province will be interested in the filing of this vacancy. St. John is the commercial mouth-piece, so to speak, of the province, while the fact that it is the chief winter port of Canada, gives it a national bearing. The man who occupies the position of secretary of the St. John Board of Trade should be a man who is not only thoroughly conversant with the city's needs and possibilities, but who is broad enough to think and act provincially and nationally, if the occasion requires it.

## ARROSTOOK POTATO CROP.

Bangor Commercial:—Potatoes in Arroostook county are three weeks late. The tops at present are as green in many cases as during July. Those which were planted on high land are looking well, however, and those that have been harvested have shown good yields.

Those on the low ground where the water has stood all summer are in bad condition but may be some improved. On the whole, however, a late, dry fall will make a good season though the actual shipments will without doubt fall considerably short of a year ago, as many last year went to market and were accepted on account of the very general shortage, while this season the potatoes of similar grade will go to the starch factories.

## DROWNED IN THE RAY.

Kenneth McLean, mate on the coasting steamer Ruby L. was drowned at the mouth of the harbor on Tuesday afternoon, while the steamer was on her way from this port to Margareville. A heavy sea was running and McLean fell overboard. He was twenty-one years of age and was a son of Thaddeus McLean, of Margareville.

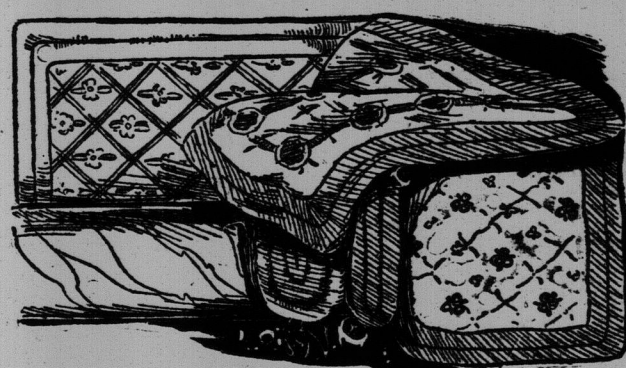
