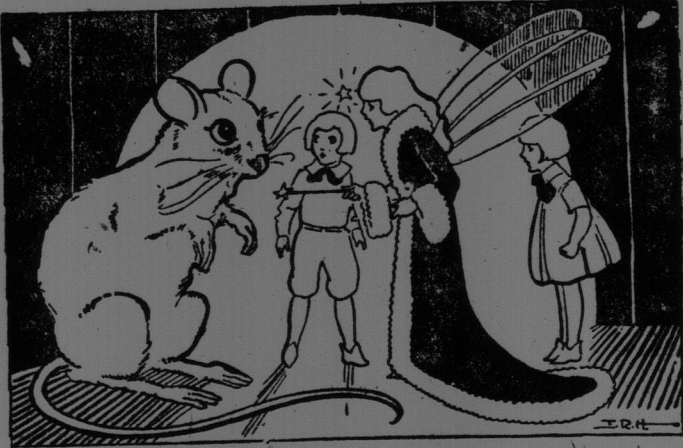

"Who's that? Who's saying, 'There, didn't I tell you?' My ears are very sharp. Who is it, I say?"

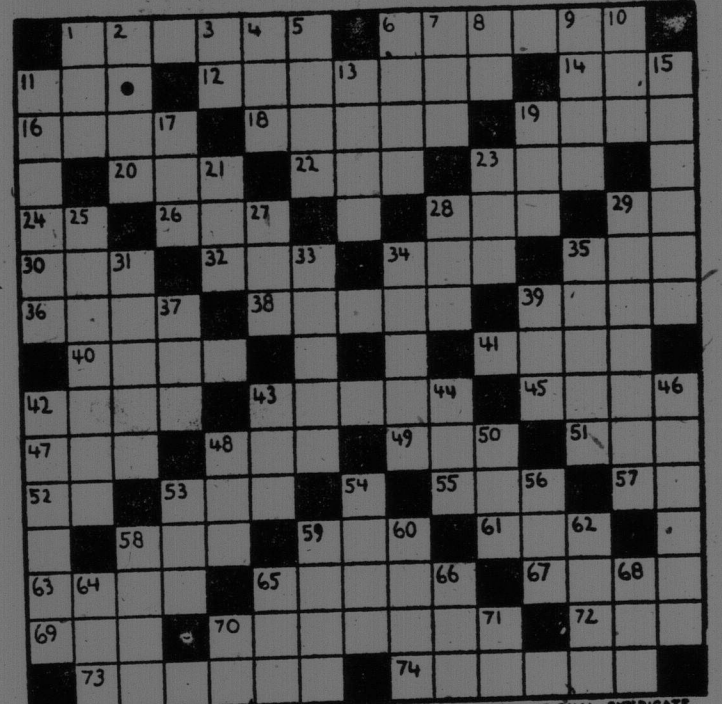
"Me," said Nancy. "And me," said Nick. "And me," said the Fairy Queen stepping out.

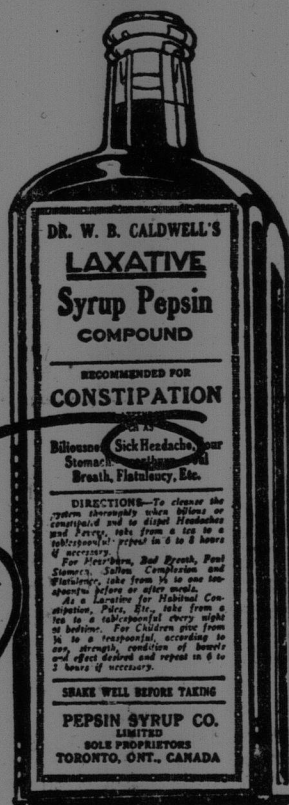
