If this matter was appealed to the Provincial Synod the whole question would be opened up under the most disadvancial Synod the whole question would be opened up under the most disadvantageous circumstances. It would make conciliation impossible, as the matter would become a party question, and the very purpose which the memoralists had in view would be defeated. He thought such action would be most disastrous, and would make a miserable exhibition before the world. He would infinitely prefer that the matter should be taken to the law courts.
