Pulp Industry Delegation.

Quite a large delegation of Chatham men left for Ottawa on Monday afternoon's Ocean-Land Express. They were Hon. Dr. Tassell, president; E. B. Cronin, manager of the Bank of Montreal; R. A. Murdoch, Mayor of Chatham; E. R. Vickery, manager of the Dominion Pulp Company's mill and W. C. Winslow, R. C. These gentlemen go to the capital of the Dominion to present to the Minister of Railways the claims of the Miramichi pulp industry to more equitable treatment than it has received in the past in the matter of transportation rates on its product. The Bank of Montreal, which owns the Maritime Sulphite Pulp Company property, is directly represented on the delegation by Manager Cronin, Mr. Winslow and his local colleague, Mr. Winslow. Mayor Murdoch represents Chatham Trade Council and Mr. Watt the Board of Trade. Mr. Vickery representing the mill of which he is manager.
