THE WATER SUPPLY.

Civic Board Discuss the Defective Service-Electricity Destroyed the Mill St Main.

At a meeting of the water and sewer-

age board yesterday afternoon the trouble with the water service was taken up.

Engineer Murdock reported on the burst of the six-inch pipe on Mill street on Feb. 27th. A hole 2 3-4 inches in diameter was eaten through the pipe. Mr. Murdock said that the iron pipe was decomposed by the electric current from the street railway track escaping downward to the main. The cost of the repair was \$58.10.
