APPEAL OF A "NEAR-G" CHINESE
Miss May McDougall, Running Away to Wed, Mixes Her Make Up — She Goes to Cell.
 New York, Oct. 16.—Miss May McDougall had not unconsciously struck a hatpin through her hair cap, but the hatpin project several inches on either side and was a discord in an otherwise harmonious masculine make-up.
 Because of inattention to this little detail in her disguise, Miss McDougall all spent in a police station, instead of being married to John Zeeman, the driver of a bakery wagon, with whom she left her home in Stamford, Conn.
 The young woman is twenty-two years old and a graduate of St. Joseph's Seminary, Hartford, Conn. Her father decided to marry her to Zeeman, who is three years her junior, and her appearance later in man's clothing, was due to the efforts of her parents to discourage the attentions of Zeeman. They first met eighteen months ago when the young man began delivering bread and rolls at the girl's home.
 Realizing that they would not receive parental consent to their marriage, they decided to elope, the young woman admitted yesterday. When Miss McDougall slipped out the back door carrying on her arms two skirts and other articles of clothing, she found Zeeman waiting behind a hedge. Fearing that her parents might discover her absence, she gave chase, the couple did not go to Stamford station, but walked across country fourteen miles to Bedford Hill, by that time Miss McDougall had changed her dress for a man's suit brought by Zeeman.
 Bedford Hill the couple came by train to the Mott Haven station. There Zeeman decided that the suit case in which he carried his baggage and he left it in a pawnshop at Third avenue and 124th street. He also placed in pawn several pieces of jewelry.
 The couple had not proceeded far when the police arrested Miss McDougall by the hat pin. Realizing that she was discovered, the young woman burst into tears. As the policeman escorted her and Zeeman to the station they were followed by a large number of on-lookers. In the clothing worn when arrested, Miss McDougall was taken before Magistrate Appleton, who held her for further examination.

Our wealth and our harvests have all been carried off by them."
 "Foreigners behaving like this are like the poison of Yang Sha. How can it be benefited that they rule over us all of the highest quality. Gentlemen, all listen to my exhortations. Organize your righteous soldiers and decide on their extermination. Kill all foreigners; kill all officials who favor foreigners; kill all foreign students; kill all who wear foreign clothing; kill all Indians; kill all who learn foreign languages. Whoever copies the records of the detriments of China, do not leave one such in the land."
 "At times like these, why should our emperor permit foreigners to teach? Organize your righteous soldiers and decide on their extermination. Kill all foreigners; kill all officials who favor foreigners; kill all foreign students; kill all who wear foreign clothing; kill all Indians; kill all who learn foreign languages. Whoever copies the records of the detriments of China, do not leave one such in the land."
 "All men with hearts should come to me. My name is 'Save the World King' and I am sent by heaven to help you. I shall lead generals who fly and soldiers who march on the earth. We can fear not the bullets of rifles. We are the righteous soldiers of heaven and heaven's strong ones. Do not regard my words as idle talk. Come rather to me to receive teaching. I will give you a salvation banner and save you from all your dangers. Then each enter in peace follow his own occupation."
 A few hundred of his fellow provincials took the new "King" banner. No foreigners were attacked or disturbed. There was a boom, however, in the price of foreign cotton cloths. This was due to the "King's" decree that his followers must wear uniforms, and the only cloths available for the purpose were those made by the hated foreigners.

HATPIN BOY'S CAP UNMasks GIRL.
STABS IN ROMANCE
King George and Queen Mary Will Have Fine Apartments on the P and O Steamer Medina.
 London, Oct. 16.—The Peninsula and Oriental Company's steamship, the Medina, on board which King George and Queen Mary will travel to India for the Durbar, has arrived at the Portsmouth dockyard, where the work of fitting and furnishing the apartments to be used by the King and Queen and their suite is being carried out. With her white hull bordered with royal blue and cream colored funnels the Medina presents the appearance of a huge yacht, and when the furnishing is complete she will be a floating palace. Both the King and Queen have given a great deal of time and consideration to their own apartments, as well as those of the members of their suite, having selected the carpets, curtains and furnishings themselves.
 The color schemes throughout are of delicate shades, and will contrast strongly with the royal splendor and magnificence with which they will be surrounded in the course of the many functions that will be given in their honor in Delhi.
 At the forward end of the vessel on the spar deck are two suites of cabins exclusively for use of their Majesties, each comprising a sitting room measuring about 22 by 15 feet by 18 feet and a bathroom about 12 by 13 feet.
 Queen's Apartment.
 On the starboard side is the one to be occupied by the Queen, and this has simple refined paneling, which is painted white throughout. The furniture in the sitting room is of satin wood, finely inlaid, and comprises specially designed writing tables, bookcases, cabinets, etc., with various settees, and easy chairs, upholstered and covered in green and white striped silk. The port and starboard rooms are of the same color and design as the coverings, and the carpet is of heavy pile, with a border of shades of green to harmonize with the coverings of the furniture.
 The bedroom, which has a communicating door from the sitting room, is carpeted in suite with the sitting room and the fittings and furniture are of the same wood, similar to that in the other room. In the dressing room attached to the suite is a swinging cot, to be used in rough weather if need be.
 On the port side is the King's suite, which is very similar to that of the Queen. Between the royal suites are the main corridor and staircase, which leads to a music room and dining room. The music room is fully carpeted in royal blue, and contains the dining saloon, which is a handsome apartment, just aft of the royal suite, and has a separate door, which can be divided into small tables if desired.
 In the Music Room.
 The music room is on the hurricane deck. The paneling here is of light oak, and the furniture consists of very comfortable settees, easy chairs, and small occasional tables, fixed where necessary.
 There are two rough weather cabins, which have been specially fitted for the King and Queen, and the moving of the vessel will not be felt so much as in their cabins forward, which are made of weather proof steel. These cabins are upholstered and decorated in similar manner to their other apartments.
