INDIANS WAIT ON GOVERNOR GENERAL

Present Their Respects and
Also a Few Grievances —
Don't Like Conspicuous.

Ottawa, Jan. 7.—A delegation of the
chiefs of the six nations confederacy
of independence, waited upon His
Excellency the Governor-General on
Saturday in council and in keeping
with the traditional custom renewed
the "Covenant Chain." The chiefs
presented the Duke with a suitable
address and with the wampum belts
significant of the position which the
King bears to the Mohawks, Senecas,
Cayugas, Tuscaroras, Onondagas and
Ojibwas of the Thames.

The chiefs also advised His Excel-
lency of grievances which the Six
Nations have against the government.
They objected to the application of
the conscription law, and requested
that it be not enforced against the
Indians on account of their already
splendid record. They also protested
against some of the actions taken by
the government of Indians affairs. His
Excellency promised consideration of
their complaints.

AN ITALIAN SINGER.
And Her Last Song

There are popular songs from
operas endeared to the hearts of the
American people, associated with
famous names. The names of "Nor-
ma" will always be associated with
Giulia Grisi, the Italian prima donna,
who sang the role of Norma at the
Metropolitan Opera House, New York,
and won the hearts of the audience by
her sweetness and wonderful compass
of voice. It was her heart-rending re-
luctance to sing "Norma" that has left
its impress on musical history. She sang
in the United States during the years
preceding the Civil War, and even
divided honors with Jenny Lind as the
most popular singer of her time. She
died in 1869, and it is said the last
song she sang was the famous selection
from "Norma" upon which her
reputation was made.

cluded in "Heart Songs" the musical
library of songs, now being placed
with its readers by this paper. The

CHANGE OF TIME CANADIAN
GOVERNMENT RAILWAYS.
Will Go in Effect January 6th, 1918.
Changes in the train schedules of
the Canadian Government Railways
which will go into effect on January
6th, will affect several of the principal
trains in and out of St. John.
No. 38, the local express for Truro,
will leave at 7.10 a.m.; No. 14 Express,
the connection with the Ocean Limited
for Halifax, at 1.20 p.m. (except Sun-
day). The evening train connecting
with the Maritime Express for Quebec
and Montreal will leave at 6.10 p.m.
as usual (daily except Sunday); No.
10, the night train for Halifax, will
leave at 11.40 p.m., ten minutes later.
The time of arriving trains is not
greatly changed. No. 19 the Maritime
Express connection will arrive at 12.55
p.m. instead of 11.50 a.m.
The Ocean Limited is to run daily
except Sunday and the Maritime Ex-
press daily.

The service to Prince Edward Island
is now via Cape Tormentine. Con-
nection will be made by No. 18 train, leav-
ing St. John at 7.10 a.m.

Synopsis of Canadian North-
west Land Regulations.

The sole head of a family, or any male over 18
years old, who was at the commencement of the
present war, and has since continued to be a British
subject or a subject of an allied or neutral country,
may homestead a quarter-section of available
Dominion Land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan, or
Alberta. Applicant must appear in person at
Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for Dis-
trict. Entry by proxy may be made on certain
conditions. Duties—Six months residence upon
and cultivation of land in each of three years.
In certain districts a homesteader may secure
an adjoining quarter-section as pre-emption.
Duties \$5.00 per acre. Duties—Reside six months
in each of three years after earning homestead
patent and cultivate 30 acres extra. May obtain
pre-emption patent as soon as homestead patent on
certain conditions.

A settler after obtaining homestead patent if he
cannot secure a pre-emption, may take a purchase
homestead in certain districts. Price \$10.00 per
acre. Must reside six months in each of three
years, cultivate 30 acres and erect a house worth
\$200.00.

Homestead of entries may count time of employment
in war laborers Canada die 1917, as residence
duties under certain conditions.

When Dominion Lands are advertised or posted
for entry, returned soldiers who have served over-
seas and have been honorably discharged, receive
the day priority in applying for entry at local
Agent's Office (but not Sub-Agency). Soldiers
papers must be presented to Agent.
