MISSIONARY MURDERED IN ASIATIC TURKEY

Rev. Charles H. Holbrook Shot to Death—Was Born and Educated in Massachusetts.

Constantinople, Aug. 15—Bible House today received a telegram reporting that the Rev. Charles H. Holbrook, a missionary, had been shot and killed at Souchier, a small village eighty miles east of Sivras, a town of Asiatic Turkey, 425 miles from Constantinople.

Mr. Holbrook at the time of his death was on an excursion with some American teachers belonging to the Sivras school. Details of the shooting are lacking here.

The Rev. Charles H. Holbrook was born in Massachusetts and was educated at Boston University and Union Theological Seminary. Mr. Holbrook was ordained in 1911, was station treasurer at Sivras of the mission of the American board of commissioners for foreign missions.

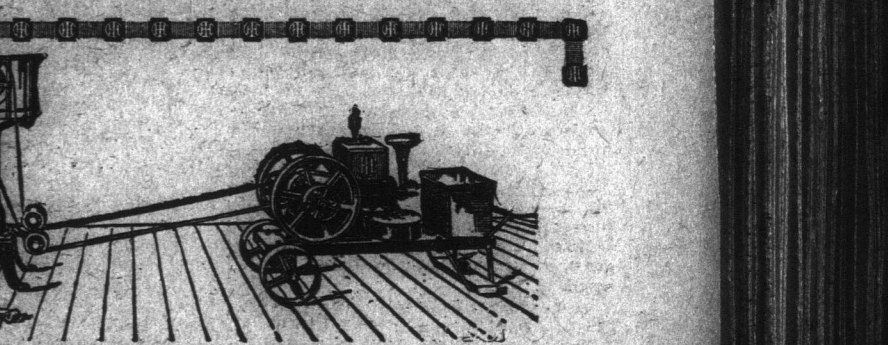
