Small, wealthy theatre owner of this city, who has been missing since December 2, 1919, and the hearing was concluded this afternoon.

Argument by counsel for the prosecution and the defence and Judge Denton's charge to the jury will be heard tomorrow. By arrangement between the counsel and the court this afternoon, it was decided that the argument of counsel should begin at 10:30,

Doughty is charged with conspiracy to kidnap Ambrose Small, but his trial on this charge will not take place until next week, owing to the holiday on Friday. A verdict will probably be reached in the theff charge tomorrow afternoon or evening.

Claims No Proof.

Had the Power

"The facts brought out in the evidence produced by the crown," Mr. Hellmuth claimed, "show that Doughty had an absolute power of attorney in connection with Mr. Small's safety deposit box to do and perform all and anything in or about the premises of the Dominion Bank, and to withdraw and change the contents of the box from time to time."

Mr. Hellmuth said further: "To my mind there is no question that Doughty was entitled to go to the box and take out the bonds and place them in any other safety deposit box that he desired to advance their safe-keeping."

Mr. Hellmuth referred to Detective Mitchell's evidence as showing that Doughty was anxious about the bonds, and wished them in order to give Mr. Small an opportunity to remunerate him for his eighteen years' service. Nothing had been advanced by the crown, Mr. Hellmuth contended, to show that the prisoner intended to deprive his employer of possession of the bonds.

Thought Them Safe.

"Jean Doughty's evidence," continued Mr. Hellmuth "showed that her brother John had told her on the eve of his departure for Montreal, that he had the bonds belonging to Mr. Small, and he told her to put them in a safety deposit box if he did not return in two or three days. Until Doughty returned to Toronto last November, there is nothing to show that he did not think they were in a safety deposit box."

Mr. Hellmuth argued that the crown had not produced any evidence to show that Doughty knew anything about trustees to the Small estate having been appointed, and he did not know, Mr. Hellmuth contended further, that there were others than Mr. Small to whom he could return the bonds. Doughty was not to be assumed to know when and how Small would return, Mr. Hellmuth said.

"Jean Doughty," continued counsel for the defence, "did nothing but what any sister would have done who had her brother's interests at heart, and also the interests of his employer. There has not been a tittle of evidence of fraudulent intent in the

Instead of putting in testimony for the defence, I. F. 
