## Sheridan sponsors nurses' aide course

A 20-week Nurses' Aide certificate course, sponsored by Sheridan College Manpower Division will be held at the Oakville Manpower Campus, starting July 20.

Organized in co-operation with the Ontario Department of Education and the Federal Department of Manpower and Immigration, the course is designed to provide basic nursing care training.

Upon completion of the course, the Nurses' Aide is sufficiently trained to care for the chronically ill in homes for the aged, to work in hospitals, nursing homes, institutions and private homes, to mention a few.

The main purpose of the NA is to relieve the registered nurse from her duties so that she may be free to attend to administrative and technical procedures.

During the 20 weeks, students will be sent out for four weeks of practical work in industry or hospitals which often

results in permanent employment for the student after graduation.

A report on the student's ability is sent by the employer to the course instructor, after the work period.

Cathleen McMurray, instructor, received her RN training at Ottawa Civic Hospital and has her public health certificate from the University of Toronto.

She has worked on staff in hospitals and has been an airline stewardess and instructor of stewardesses.

In 1964 she went into industry as an occupation nurse and has worked for the Department of Health, teaching health care.

Mrs. McMurray has been employed as a public health nurse in elementary schools.

Topics to be covered during the course include: personal hygiene, hospital ethics, simple anatomy and physiology and general nursing.

English composition, mathematics and science concludes the course of study. There is no fee for Canada Manpower students.

To be eligible for the course, applicants must have grade eight education or equivalent, absorb instruction in English, enjoy good health, must like helping people and have a cheerful disposition. Hours are from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m.

Materials for the course are supplied by the Manpower Campus.

## Board buys 20 acres

MISSISSAUGA — A committee of the board of education last week decided to purchase 20 acres of land from Bramalea Consolidated Ltd., the developers of Bramalea, for \$200,000.

The capital expenditure and building committee will recommend to the general board meeting on July 28 that they buy the 20 acres for the construction of Chinguacousy Secondary School.

It had been earlier agreed that the board would purchase land from Bramalea Consolidated Developments at \$10,000 an acre. Provision for the purchase was made in the 1970 Capital Budget which was slashed in half this spring by the provincial government.

However, Chinguacousy Secondary was one of the projects left on the reduced list.

## Wharton Way noise complaints get action from council

Mississauga — Mississauga industrial commissioner, Ken Rowe, will "click to the companies involved" in a noise problem bothering residents in the Wharton Way area.

Complaints were received by the town about high noise levels coming from the High-

way Trailers of Canada Ltd. on Wharton north of Highway 5. Mayor Bob Speck reported he had taken several of the complaints himself and was told that Highway Trailers was in the process of looking for a new location north of Highway 401. Until that time, he said, the plant is almost shut down.

"If we would get moving and process their request they will move as fast as possible," Speck added. "But even at that rate it will take at least

a year or two before they're out of there."

A company wishing to build must have its application for a building permit processed, its building plan examined and approved by the planning board, all of which can take considerable time.

"We should put pressure on them anyway to cut down their noise," Councillor Caye Killaby insisted. "Industrial noise can be very aggravating especially in the summer."

## Glenn Grice 'idea man'

MISSISSAUGA — Glenn Grice, last year's board of education chairman, is earning the reputation of this year's self-appointed "new idea" man.

Grice proposed at last week's capital expenditure and building committee that a new invention be investigated regarding potential use on county schools.

The self-adhesive product is a film placed on windows that is supposed to reduce the temperature of the room by cutting down on infrared rays, the sun's rays responsible for most overheating.

The administration agreed to look into the products' potential but one board spokesman said it would probably be useful only if the entire room were made of glass.

## Aerospace declares loss

MISSISSAUGA — Spar Aerospace Products Ltd., of Malton, has declared a loss for the year ended Dec. 31, 1969, compared with a restated profit of \$22,360 a year earlier.

Revenue rose to \$7,147,888 from \$5,435,614. The 1969 results include a tax recovery of \$13,600, non-recurring relocation costs of \$151,810 and a \$39,246 charge to reflect the evaluation downward of an investment in a subsidiary.

Also included are results of subsidiary York Gears Ltd. from July 3, which contributed revenue of about \$3-million. The 1968 profit is after a \$24,000 organization and initial expense charge. L. D. Clarke, president, said this week that directors are reluctant to predict operating results for this year because of the consolidation of the operations of York Gears and Spar Aerospace.

## Family Life seminars offered by Sheridan

Sheridan College will sponsor two week-long seminars on Family Life Education, staffed by outstanding authorities in the profession.

Both seminars will run concurrently Aug. 24 to Aug. 29 at the University of Guelph.

Arranged by Don Wilson, Family Life Consultant for Sheridan, the programs will provide an opportunity for intensive training in Family Life Education with concentration on key issues.

Directing one of the courses will be Dr. Blaine R. Porter, Dean of the College of Family Living at Brigham Young University in Provo, Utah.

This seminar provides a foundation in the philosophy and principles on Family Life Education and gives participants an opportunity to participate in group discussions.

Dr. Porter is chairman of the Special Committee on Family Life Education for the Board of Governors of Family Relations. He is a familiar figure to those involved in Family Life Education and is assisted by his associates.

He has lectured at various workshops and to groups, organizations and educators in Canada and the United States.

He will be assisted by Professor Clark Elizey of Texas Technological College. Professor Elizey has many years of experience in teaching and writing about marriage and family relations.

Also assisting Dr. Porter will be Dr. Ruth Brasher, chairman of Home Economics Education at Brigham Young University.

Dr. Brasher has recently taken over the chairmanship of this department after having spent 12 years at Oregon

State University working in Home Economics and Family Life Education. She has taught at elementary and secondary schools.

The other seminar will be a Family Life Education workshop for those who have had seminar experience in this field and will provide an opportunity for work and experimentation in curriculum and methodology of teaching Family Life Education.

Heading this seminar will be Dr. Joel Moss, chairman of the Department of Child Development and Family Relations at Brigham Young University.

Dr. Moss taught teaching methods and procedures for Sheridan last August and gave a special graduate university course last fall at Sheridan College.

He will be assisted by Dr. Don Carter, chairman of Family and Child Development at Utah State University and Dr. James Walters, chairman of Child Development and Family Relations at Oklahoma State University.

Dr. Walters was the 1968 recipient of the Osborne Teaching Award, given by the National Council on Family Relations, to the outstanding Family Life Teacher of the year. Dr. Carter is a member of the Board of Directors of the NCFR.

Topics to be presented in Dr. Porter's seminar will include: challenges of family life education; building effective interpersonal relationships; developing sensitivity; values as they relate to one's role as a teacher; needs of students as viewed by a family life educator and social changes affecting the family.

## Famous artist at Lorne Pk. S.S.

Lorne Park Secondary School, operated as a Summer Youth Centre by the Mississauga Recreation and Parks Department, will offer a demonstration and instruction in the use of a box loom by international artist Hardev Singh on Thursday, July 16 at 7:30 p.m.

Hardev, currently using an art studio in Clarkson for the summer, was born in India, and has lived most part of his creative life in Europe. He studied at the College of Art in New Delhi. On an Italian Government fellowship for higher studies in Rome, he worked on the restoration of Etruscan Tombs. He has shown his works in India, Europe and recently in Toronto.

He was invited to participate in the International Meetings and Symposia in Poland, where he lived and worked on a fellowship from the Polish Ministry of Culture.

A master of many art forms, he will be available to meet and instruct both adults and youth at the Youth Centre's Art Workshop during the summer months.

## Sailing for adults

Adults who want to sail and never had the opportunity may now enrol in a five-week Basic Sailing Course, offered by Sheridan College Continuing Education Division.

The course starts the week of July 21 and will include a combination of classroom and water instruction. Classroom studies, to be held in Brampton, include sailing language, basic sailing manoeuvres, rigging, water safety and rules of etiquette.

Water instruction will be given on a 18-foot keelboat in Lake Ontario where classroom theory will be demonstrated.

Course instructor, and experienced sailor, will be David Campbell who has sailed Toronto, Europe and the Bahamas.

The only requirement needed for enrolment is an interest in sailing.
