

- Q. Now, when Lynch was being punished in the first place I suggest to you that Sgt. Harvey stood behind Lynch.
- A. Sgt. Harvey did.
- Q. And held his arms?
- A. That is not true, sir.
- Q. Was it his shoulders?
- A. No, sir, I don't think Sgt. Harvey had his hand on the man at all.
- Q. What was he standing behind him for?
- A. Well, for one thing, it was only a very thin wall where we were punishing Lynch and where some patients were on the other side and Lynch, if he was slapped even, would throw himself against this wall quite violently, threatening to knock it down. And that is the reason Harvey was standing behind Lynch.
- Q. Did you say "we were punishing Lynch"?
- A. I didn't say "we". I said I was punishing Lynch.
- Q. Oh, now you change it? At what stage in your stay in the camp did you come to approve these proceedings?
- A. I would say in the spring of 1944.
- Q. About the time that you became a member of the committee?
- A. No, sir, somewhat before that, actually.
- Q. How much before?
- A. Two or three months actually.
- Q. Well now, what do you mean by the spring--what month?
- A. Well, I became a member of the judicial committee in July 1944.
- Q. Were you a member when Podosky was tried?
- A. Yes, sir, I was.
- Q. And that was before Dr. Stenning left the camp?
- A. Yes, sir.
- Q. And Dr. Stenning left the camp on the 23rd day of June 1944?
- A. I don't know when he left, sir. It would be about that time I imagine.
- Q. Well now, would you like to revise your statement in view of that?
- A. You will have to explain yourself, sir. I don't know just what you mean.
- Q. Well, you say you became a member of the committee in July 1944.
