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## ADDRESS, &c.

## Gentleman Electors,

B EFORE the Sheriff proceeds to open the Poll, I muft beg leave to fay a few words to you, to prevent both mifconception and mifreprefentation refpecting fome particulars, which it will not perhaps be improper for you clearly to underthand.—You have now heard the Act for regulating Electione read to you, the very first claufe of which fufficiently thews, that there was no connection whatever between His Majefty's approbation of it and the diffolution of the late Houfe of Affembly—for it contains provisions for the regulation not only of any general Election fublequent to it's receiving the Royal affent, but also of any particular one, that might be occafioned by a vacancy in that very Houfe, which framed it.

THIS ACT was passed with a suspending clause in 1791, in the fifth Session of the first House, that was called in this Province after its separation from Nova-Scotia.—A second House was summoned in 1793, which has been suddenly dissolved before it had
