

## ADDRESS, &c.

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*Gentlemen Electors,*

**B**EFORE the Sheriff proceeds to open the Poll, I must beg leave to say a few words to you, to prevent both misconception and misrepresentation respecting some particulars, which it will not perhaps be improper for you clearly to understand.—You have now heard the Act for regulating Elections read to you, the very first clause of which sufficiently shews, that there was no connection whatever between His Majesty's approbation of it and the dissolution of the late House of Assembly—for it contains provisions for the regulation not only of any general Election subsequent to it's receiving the Royal assent, but also of any particular one, that might be occasioned by a vacancy in that very House, which framed it.

THIS Act was passed with a suspending clause in 1791, in the fifth Session of the first House, that was called in this Province after its separation from Nova-Scotia.—A second House was summoned in 1793, which has been suddenly dissolved before it  
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
