1. Would there be injury to stock pastured in an orchard after it has been thoroughly sprayed with lime-sulphur ?

2. Or would it be injurious to hay where the trees were sprayed with arsenate of lead ?

3. What would be the best kind of a building to put up, twenty-five or thirty feet from the barn, for gasoline engine ? Would you recommend cement ? If so, how thick would I have to put the wall, how strong would I have to have it; or do you think cement would be too damp? If so, would it be all right to put cement foundation and frame on top ?

2. We would not consider this seriously dangerous.

3. Cement concrete foundation, with frame, double-boarded, with building paper between, would make a satisfactory building, and preferable to cement walls. A good base for the engine to rest upon could be made of cement. If the ground be thoroughly dry, an earth floor might serve for the rest of the space; but if used as a tool or workshop or separator room, it would be better to floor the whole. An engine room should be dry for several reasons; comfortable, and protected with sufficient light.

1. Do you think peas sown rather thick on well-worked land about May 1st, would be tall enough by June 18th to plow under as one plants potatoes? Would they be a good fertilizer for such a crop? I thought if one could get crop in bulk enough to turn under, it would be better than clover, as one could kill any grass more fully before sowing peas, hence it would be easier working afterwards.

2. I know a tract of land in Ontario which is entirely free of stones of all kinds, varying in quality from sandy loam to clay loam, which gives good crops of wheat, clover and oats. The land is valued high, at \$10,000 per 100 acres, but quite a number of farmers claim that they would prefer a few small or large stones, as it is more apt to be better land where stones are. Is there any reason to be afraid to buy a farm in such a part where there is no stones? I value such land much higher than where there are a few small stones. Am I right?

3. A farmer told me lately he could, with no money, buy a farm by hunting up the right farm and securing the man's price and terms, and then return to a Loan Company and get a mortgage to the extent of half the value of the farm he wished to purchase. This he would use partly to pay down on farm, the other part to buy stock and implements. Do you think he could do such a thing? Are companies so keen to lend money?

Ans.—1. If the peas do well, they should be a sufficient height to add much organic matter to the soil by the 18th of June. Peas are a nitrogenous crop of the same family as clover, but clover is to be preferred in plowing down for a fertilizer, and to be plowed down as early as June 18th would give a far larger crop and leave the soil in better condition for the potatoes. Grass gives very little trouble in potatoes on a clover sod.

2. Many stony farms are good farms, but there are many farms entirely free from stones, which are very fertile, and these farms are much more easily worked than those covered with stones. The presence of rocks is not important to the fertility, but the kind of rock from which the soil comes is important. Good land free from stone is of greater value than stony land.

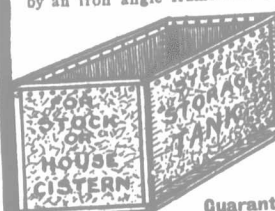
