In consequence the trains are running pretty closely on time.

Tas: Outario erop report showing the condition of the various products up to June 15 has recently been iseued. From it we gather that the weather in June had so far boen quite favorable to the growth of both erops and truit. The grape vines have auffored extensively, and the peach trees were injured to some extent by frost. There is promise of only a fair crop,

Thes people of Canada have long had to complain of the delays and inconveniences ontailed in connection with money orders between Canado and Hawaii and Oanadn and Australia. Recently, however, arrangements have been completed, making Viotoris the Dominion exchange office for this service, all sdrices of $m$ ney orders isued for or from the countries named being dealt with here.

Ir would appear that there is not likely to be much delay in taking action with regard to rodyking the Fruser valley. Colonel Baker recently announced at Chilliwack that the Provinoial Government were Already in communication with the Federal suthorities on the subject, and in the menutine would sanction and astist any local works which complied with the provisiuns of the dyking act, and could be made parl of the general dyking scheme.

financial diffeulties, which have at lat been solved by the fitcorporition of the concern as "the American Grocery Oom. pany," with a capital of three millions. In future, the concern will confine itwelf to the grocery biasiness proper, reduce its expenses and relinquish the various manufacturing and canning enterprises in which it had extensively embarked.
Sours time back, in order to aroid all annogances in connection with the U. S. canal at Sault Ste. Marie and obriate the retaliation which undor certain circumatances was threatened by the Americans, the Canadian Government undertook to construct a canal on Canadian territory. This, it is said, is just about complete, and water will be lot in about the 10th July. It will undoubtedly prove to be a great adrantage to shippers of Canadian grain and priduce, far ahead of many undertakings which have been carried out by the Ottana authorities.

Reonstur, Jüdge Ross, at Ottawa, deeided that if a certain oivil servant did not pay his debts, he must go to jail. At the Dominion capital, there have not been a few gentry in the service who have made it their business to contract debts and then set their creditors at defiance, their public position being considered sufficient to rolieve them from the consequences of suits for debt. Whether or not theirs was a legal contention, certain is it that it has been a most diahonest one, and it in to be hoped that now the public have seen the last of this kind of thing.
We observe that Mr. Oorbould, M. P., has again brought up in the Oanadian House of Commons the subject of lobater cultivation on the Pacific coast. Several ventures in this line, conducted both by Americans and Canadians, have, so far, proved to be failures, and Sir Charles Tupper predicts failure for this the latest proposal, nevertheless he says that he will do his best to secure another trina. Superintendent Durfes, of the Insurance Department of Illinuis, recently made the following pertinent observa. tions: "The solution of the difficulties surrounding the insurance situation lies more largely with the people than with the companies.
