A Message from his Majesty's Council by Mr. Carmichael their Clerk.

His Majesty's Council have passed the following Bills, without any amendments.

A Bill intituled "an Act to prevent the using or riding horses without the permission of the owners, and to repeal an Act made and passed in the thirty-sixth year of his late Majesty's Reign, intituled an Act to prevent disorderly persons from taking and riding or using the horses of others without their leave or permission."

A Bill intituled "an Act to prevent the running at large of Boar Pigs, and to restrain Swine from going at large without rings."

A Bill intituled "an Act to prevent the using or taking away Boats, Flats, or Canoes, without consent of the owners."

A Bill intituled an Act to continue an Act intituled "an Act for regulating Juries, and further declaring the qualifications of Jurors," also.

A Bill intituled "an Act to repeal certain parts of an Act relating to Treasons and Felonies."

By Order, the Attorney General carried to his Majesty's Council, the Bill intituled "an Act for summary punishment in certain cases of persons wilfully or maliciously damaging or committing Trespasses on public or private property," with a proposed amendment.

Mr. Stewart moved for leave to bring in a petition from the Inhabitants of Prince Town Royalty, praying redress for certain grievances therein complained of.

Leave being granted, it was accord-

ingly read, and ordered to lie on the Table.

On Motion, the House resolved itself into a Committee of the whole House to resume the consideration of the Report of the sub-Committee on the Public Accounts,

Mr. Speaker left the Chair,

Mr. Campbell took the Chair of the Committee,

Mr. Speaker resumed the Chair,

Mr. Campbell Chairman of the Committee reported, That they had taken the Report of the sub-Committee into consideration, and agreed to the same with alterations and amendments. By order the Report of the Committee was agreed to by the House, which is as follows, viz.

That the Committee have carefully inspected the several documents laid before them and have found the different Accounts of the Treasurer and Collectors' correct, and it appears that on the 26th of July 1820, a balance of £1845 16 10 remained in the Treasurer's hands, and that from that period to the 21st of January, 1825, a sum of £13,102 12 0½ has been received by the Treasurer.

That during the above period the sum of £10,454 3 9½ has been paid by the Treasurer, including his commission of 7½ per cent. and that the sum of £4,494 5 1 remained in the Treasurer's hands in money and securities on the 21st of January, 1825.
