

Joseph Gillies was this morning entenced to serve twelve months in Central prison for housebreaking and theft. Two charges were lodged against the defendant one by Edwin Gibbens and the other by Joseph Saggesse and for each he was sentenced to serve 6 months. Both charges were proven beyond a doubt and the Magistrate's decision against the defendant was clearly a just one. The defendant pleaded not guilty to the charge when it was read to him but later he practically confessed and pleaded for mercy. Gillies said, "Your Worship, this is the last time that I will ever appear in any court."
