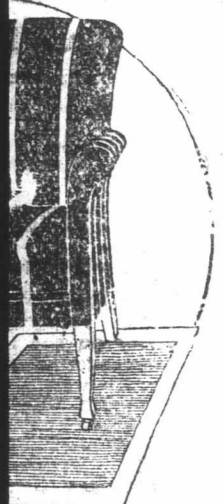

WHISKEY RUNNERS FIGHT POLICE

Toledo, O., Nov. 28.—Two men are dead, several others wounded and seven Detroit men are under arrest following a gun battle here last night between railroad police and 15 or more whiskey runners from Michigan, a dry state.

The dead are: L. L. Cracken, 30 years old, a railway employe, and Tishon Lawachik of Detroit.

The battle opened when the police saw the men carrying sacks over their shoulders in a railway yard in the outskirts of the city and stopped them, suspecting them of being box car robbers. The dead whiskey runner was identified by papers in his pockets.

The sacks carried by the men were filled with whiskey.
