## SIR CHARLES RETIRES.

### He Declares the Result of the Elections is a Relief to Him.

Montreal, November 10.—Despite the fact that Sir Charles Tupper has received offers from members in six provinces to resign and make way for him, announces his final decision to retire from public life.

"With all seriousness," he declares, "the relief from public life is a boon, the greatest I have enjoyed for years. The good people of Cape Breton have given me the opportunity I desired."

He declared that he had made no great effort to hold his seat, having been only four days in the county. He had spent his time elsewhere because he felt it his duty to be in the fight and help his supporters throughout the Dominion. He sent a message of good will to the people of Cape Breton, and added: "As I step out of public life I am proud to be able to say that I never used nor countenanced the using of any but one policy in each and all the provinces. I defy any man to say that I have ever reflected upon any nationality or done other than help to cement the bond of union between all the races as Canadians with a common heritage and a common future. God forbid that there should be anything but peace and good will throughout the Dominion. There is a great future for the Conservative party, and its future has not at any time in four years looked as bright as to-day."

WHO WILL BE LEADER? Toronto, Nov. 10.—The announcement of the decision of Sir Charles Tupper to retire from public life, made by the Conservative leader at Montreal, caused considerable excitement in political circles. Few of the prominent Conservatives of this district were disposed to give their opinion for publication as to the party leadership. W. R. Brock, M. P. for Centre Toronto, and one of Sir Charles' most intimate friends in Ontario, said it would be most disastrous for the party and the country were Sir Charles to adhere to the view said to have been expressed by him. And yet, at his time of life, it would be very hard to go to Ottawa and fight in opposition for four or five years. It is not to be wondered at, therefore, that he wishes to retire. E. B. Olen, M. P., says it would take the party some time to get accustomed to the new conditions created by Sir Charles' retirement. The prevailing view among Conservatives is that Mr. Foster is Sir Charles' natural successor. It was stated that local Conservatives were freely considering the name of R. I. Borden, M. P. of Halifax, for the leadership of the Conservative party in succession to Sir Charles' Pupae. Mr. Borden is regarded as one of the safest and most conciliatory of the younger Conservative members, and has in a marked degree the art of making friends.

MARKET PRICES. There was an excellent market to-day. Butter was exceedingly scarce at 22c. a pound, and eggs were only in fair supply at 16 cents a dozen. Winter pears were about the only fruit offered and they sold at 15 cents a peck, or 50 cents a bushel. There was a good supply of vegetables. Cauliflowers sold at 5c. to 10c. each, cabbages at about the same price. Herring, fresh, sold at 25 cents a peck, or 50 cents a bushel. Dried pork was quite plentiful at 10c. a lb.

## THE DICTATOR OF

Newfoundland Finds His Candidates Being Badly Beaten.

The Bond Government Winning All Along the Line.

St. John, Newfoundland, Nov. 10.—Official returns of the general election have been received from eight districts. Of these the Bond Government, or Liberal party, won seven, the Reid-Morris, or Tory party, securing only one. In the Carbonear district, Mr. Maddock, Liberal, defeated Mr. Powell, Tory, who is Mr. Reid's surveyor, increasing the Liberal majority from 35 to 184. In the Ferryland district, which returns two members to the Legislature, Messrs. Cashin and Ryan, Liberals, defeated Messrs. McGullock and Cleary, Tories, and Mr. Coudon, Independent, securing a plurality of 790. In Harbor Main district, which also returns two members, Messrs. Morris and St. John, Liberals, defeated Messrs. Toole and Fitzgibbon, Tories, and Mr. Lewis, Independent, with a plurality of 872. In the Bay de Verde, formerly Tory by 260 majority, Messrs. Woods and Knight, Liberals, defeated Messrs. Mercer and Rogerson, Tories, securing an aggregate majority of 60. The count is now about half completed in St. John's. In the eastern division of the city Messrs. Dwyer, Furlong, Murphy, Liberals, are known to have received more than 1,000 votes as against 300 cast for each of the three Tory candidates. Messrs. White, Ryan and Parsons, in the western division of the city Messrs. Morris, Anderson and Scott, Liberals, are known to have received about 1,200 votes each, as against 500 cast for each of the three Tory candidates. Messrs. Ryan, Collier and Malley. The election of these six Liberals is morally certain. In the Harbor Grace district, which returns three members, Surveyor-General Dawa and Messrs. Harvey and Oke, Liberals, defeated Messrs. Chardow, Mun and Ross. The returns thus far, therefore, show the election of 16 Liberals and one Tory. Nineteen seats have yet to be heard from, but there is no reason to believe that there will be any decided alteration in the ratio thus far indicated, especially as the Tories concede the Liberals six more seats in the Parsonia and Burin districts. Already it is evident that the country has completely repudiated Mr. Reid and his reputed scheme for controlling the Legislature.

## LOCAL BRIEFS

Local drovers are paying from \$1 to \$1.25 per cwt. for live hogs. They report the market firm at these prices.

J. L. Wagner, Leamington, exhibited a potato on Tuesday, grown by David Eubank, on the reclaimed marsh lands in Mexico, weighing 4 lbs. 6 oz. It is of the White Elephant variety. (The new R. C. church at Woodlee will be dedicated on Sunday, Nov. 11, by Bishop McEvoy, of London. In the evening His Lordship will deliver an address on "The Holy Land.")

On Monday evening next a congregational meeting of the First Presbyterian church will be held for the purpose of considering the various candidates for the vacant pastorate. J. B. R. Cathcart of the Chatham Loan & Savings Co., was born on the 9th of November. He had forgotten all about his natal day until he went home last evening, when he found a large number of his friends assembled to celebrate the anniversary. A most enjoyable time was spent in music and games, and the evening passed merrily away.
