

LAKE BAIKAL, HOLY SEA

AN OBSTACLE TO THE CZAR'S SUC-CESS IN FAR EAST WAR.

Cuts the Transsiberian Railway in Two Parts-How It is Crossed in Summer and in Winter-Miles of Ice a Serious way Transfers Whole Trains Across.

An interesting phase of the war in the Far East, both to military men and the public generally, is the enormous task that confronts Russia enormous task that confronts Russia in maintaining the integrity of her line of communication across the continent of Asia and Lake Esikal. The conduct of military operations, with only a single track of railroad to connect the soat of war with the main base of supplies thousands of miles away, is unprecedented in warfare, and it is not impossible that the road will prove insufficient when the pinch comes.



is one of the largest fresh water lakes in the world, being exceeded in size only by the three largest Canadian lakes and Victoria Nyanza. It is 390 miles long and from 20 to 50 wide and is situated in southern Siberia on the line of the Trans-Siberian Road, which it breaks. A line is being built around the south shore of the lake; but, as the distance is several hundred miles and the lake is surrounded by mountains, this probably will not be completed until the Russo-Japanese war pleted until the Russo-Japanese war

pleted until the Russo-Japaness war has passed into history.

The gap in the road caused by the lake is thirty-seven miles wide, and in summer this is overcome by the use of huge ferryboats which transport entire trains across it. From November to April, however, the lake is frozen to a depth of four to nine feet, and traffic is carried on over the fee. Rails are laid across the frozen surface, and trains are hauled over by engines: The ice is frequently broken by crevasses, which often delay traffic for days, until the crevasses are frozen sufficiently solid to bear the weight of a train.

train.

The rails have fust been laid across the ice, but only a few days ago a detachment of troops was frozen to death while crossing the lake. The soldiers are transported on the Trans-Siberian Railroad in box cars fitted with bunks, and it is probable that in the hurry to desprobable that in the hurry to despatch them to Manchusia many have been marched across the ice. The battalion reported to have been frozen was doubtless overwhelmed by one of the blizzards for which the lake is noted.

During the late fall and early spring one of the huge ice breakers built by Vice-Admiral Makaroff is used to smash a channel across the lake for the railway transports.


