Visit the Schools.

How many of our school children's parents visit the school? How many know what their children are studying or how they are progressing? Now we hear some of you say: "The teacher knows better what they ought to study than I do. While that may be in part true, the carpenter or dress maker or painter knows better how to do the work than you do and yet you do not leave it all to them.

On the rising generation depends the future welfare of the great Dominion. Patrons and parents, take more interest in our schools and visit them often, and by your presence give the teachers more encouragement; ask them how your children are getting on. Perhaps a few minutes talk with them may save trouble that years cannot undo. Think about this and ask yourself if this is not right.—Exchange.

A Disgraceful Incident.
An incident which it is a mild use of language to characterize as disgraceful, occurred on Wednesday last, in the House of Commons in Ottawa. In reply to a remark by Mr. Fowler of Kings-Albert, charging Mr. Ralph Smith, of Nanaimo, with having ambitions in reference to the governorship of British Columbia, Mr. Duncan Ross, of Yale-Cariboo, retorted Mr. Fowler with having ambitions of another character and hinted at certain land transactions of the latter in the Northwest. To this, amid much confusion, Mr. Fowler, replied in heated and violent language. He held that Parliament had nothing to do with his private business and if his personal character was to be attacked he would retaliate by discussing the private character of members of the government and other members of Parliament on the other side of the House, and their connection with women, wine and graft. These words constituted a serious accusation. If Mr. Fowler used them in a fit of anger and without due warrant, with a view to blinding any unprejudiced jury into his own record, he has earned the contempt of Parliament and the country. If on the other hand, the words were used advisedly and have a basis in fact, then the member for Kings-Albert should be called upon to define and give the fullest opportunity to substantiate his charges. We do not subscribe to the view that Parliament has nothing to do with the personal character of its members. Surely men in the positions in which members of Parliament are placed, should be expected to lead exemplary lives, and if any do not conform to decent moral standards, then Parliament, and the people, too, should have something, and something very emphatic, to say about it.—Maritime Biptist.

Cheverie Oil.
The annual general meeting of the Nova Scotia Oil & Gas Company, Limited, took place in Kentville on the 1st inst. There was a large attendance and the affairs of the Company were thoroughly gone into from its organization regarding the disposition of its stock and funds. The members of the Company were thoroughly convinced of the integrity of the Directorate and that the affairs of the Company had been managed judiciously and economically, and that the present unsatisfactory financial condition is due to causes over which they had no control, and resulted from accidents and emergencies encountered in the practical work. The utmost confidence was expressed in the existence of oil at Cheverie, and further efforts are to be made to secure the necessary funds to complete the test, as no test has yet really been made, as the necessary depth was not attainable in any of the wells drilled. Messrs Wm. Yould, A. E. Calkin, of Kentville, and Sidney Bleckhorn, of Canimung, were elected directors of the company in the place of the three retiring directors from New Brunswick. At a business meeting of the directors Capt. C. O. Allen was re-elected President; Capt. Flemming, Vice President; Dr. Jos. Hayes, Secretary.
