

CITY COUNCIL.

Arranging to Receive the Governor General.

The regular meeting of the City Council was held on Tuesday evening. There were present Mayor Sleeman in the chair, Ald. Coffey, Kloepper, Taylor, Hewer, Nelson, Bully, Barber, Palmer, Scroggie, Lamproy.

Several accounts for work on local improvement, certified by the engineers, were referred to Finance.

WATERWORKS.

Ald. Barber, chairman, reported, recommending payment of the following accounts:—D. K. Rogers & Son, \$145; J. C. Williams, \$62.95; J. M. Bond & Co., \$90.00; total, \$337.95.

The chairman stated that all the Kennedy accounts had been certified by the Engineer.

The report was adopted.

BOARD OF WORKS.

Ald. Hewer reported:—Your committee has considered the accounts and report of the setting city engineer re extra on D. Kloepper's contract at Wells' bridge, and recommends payment of the accounts as follows:—

Extra on bridge \$170 88
Walks, roads and approaches 247 25

Total \$418 08
By cash paid on account 100 00

Balance \$318 08

The above amount of \$318 has been paid from the ordinary grant of your committee, and as no provision has been made for the balance, we would recommend that the sum of \$318 be placed to the credit of your committee to pay the above indebtedness.

The chairman stated that after paying \$100 on Wells' bridge extra, all accounts for Dec. 31, 1892, two weeks till the new Council met, he would have over \$40 to the good.

The report was adopted, and, on motion of Ald. Hewer and Bully, the Council made a grant of \$100 as asked for, so as to enable the treasurer to get it paid and balance up his accounts.

THE GOVERNOR GENERAL'S VISIT.

Mayor Sleeman read the telegram which he had received from Mr. Walsh, A. D. C. to the Governor General, acquainting him of his intention to visit Guelph and the O. A. College on Friday. He had also received the following letter:

Government House, Ottawa, Jan. 2, 1893.

Dear Sir,—His Excellency the Governor General thinks that you may like to be informed that he intends, during the course of the next fortnight to visit certain portions of the Province of Ontario, and that he will probably be at Guelph on the 6th inst. for a few hours. He would be glad if it were possible to make acquaintance with any of your citizens who might desire it, and if time admits to see something of your city, and of the leading industries.

But Lord Stanley is especially anxious that his visit should not cause any inconvenience or expense to any one, and that all formality should be dispensed with, as far as possible may be. He will be living on board his car and will be accompanied only by myself and, perhaps, by Sir James Grant, who is travelling with him.

Mr. James Innes, M. P., and President Mills, O. A. College, were present to help in any action the Council might take.

President Mills said he had received no official notification. He presumed that the Mayor was deemed sufficient. He would co-operate in whatever the Council might do.

Ald. Coffey said the city would be honored by a visit from the Governor General, and recalled the reception to Lord Dufferin, that most popular of the Queen's representatives in Canada. It was the duty of the Corporation to extend the hospitality of the city to the Governor General, the same as it was to the Queen. It was an opportunity to show the loyalty of the city to the Crown, a loyalty befitting their name. The O. A. College and Board of Trade should be asked to co-operate. The city of Guelph was the handsomest and most prosperous, taking it all round, in the Dominion, and this visit would be of much benefit to Guelph, when Lord Stanley returned to England and told of his travels there. They owed it to the Dominion and the city to show His Excellency just where they stood at this time. There should be no half heartedness, but he should be made more than ordinarily welcome. He was sorry pressing engagements would keep him most of the week, and take him away on Friday, but he would do what he could.

Ald. Hewer was quite in accord with Ald. Coffey's sentiments. He should be given a royal reception which would be a credit to the city.

Ald. Lamproy was in favor of doing all they could to extend him a most hospitable welcome. They should be supported by the Board of Trade and the manufacturers.

On motion of Ald. Scroggie and Hewer, the communications were referred to the Reception Committee to make such arrangements as they might deem necessary.

This Committee consists of Ald. Scroggie, chairman, Hewer, Coffey, Palmer, Lamproy and the Mayor.

The Council then adjourned.

THE RECEPTION OF THE GOVERNOR GENERAL.

After the Council adjourned the Reception Committee met and talked over what arrangements should be made for the reception of His Excellency Lord Stanley of Preston, Ald. Scroggie in the chair. Mr. Mills, President of the College, and Mr. Innes were present. It was agreed to ask the co-operation of the chairman of the Board of Trade and the chairman of the Public and Separate School Boards. The final arrangements will be discussed and agreed on at a meeting of the committee to be held at four o'clock. From this time it was decided that on the arrival of the Governor he should be taken to the College. After a thorough inspection of it and the farm buildings, lunch would be served. He will then return to town, visit some of the schools and factories, and hold an informal reception in the Council chamber.

THE GOVERNOR GOING WEST.

Mayor Hodgins, of Stratford, on Tuesday received a letter to the same purport as that received by Mayor Sleeman, stating that His Excellency would reach Stratford about noon on the 7th, where he would stay a few hours. From this and also from what is stated in his letter, it will be seen that the Governor is making a short tour through the Western part of the Province.

A Murderous Assault.

Berlin, Jan. 2.—The services of Detective Kilgore were sought yesterday morning by a party from Florence, a small burg some twelve miles north of here, to have a carpenter of that place named Casper Mogk, arrested for feloniously wounding a neighbor named Baedine with a chisel. It appears the two men were in Mogk's carpenter shop Saturday evening, when they disagreed and began to fight. In the struggle Mogk picked up a long handled two inch chisel and inflicted several deep cuts in Baedine's forehead. The wounded man's screams brought assistance, and Mogk was deprived of his murderous weapon, the wounded man conveyed to his home and medical assistance sent for. Kilgore was unable to find his man on arrival in the village, and reports the wounded man as being quite low. Today the officer obtained a copy of Mogk's whereabouts and arrested him near Shakespeare.

The Week of Prayers.

The second meeting of the Week of Prayer was held last night in the First Baptist church. Rev. W. Hestley presiding. The attendance was very good. Several prayers were offered by Rev. Dr. Hestley, Rev. A. Cunningham, and R. J. Beattie and Mr. L. Musselman. Rev. J. C. Smith gave an able address on "Personal Testimony for Christ." He spoke of the Church universal, and the need there was at this time for personal testimony for Christ. He touched briefly on all the subjects mentioned in the programme to be dealt with. He was followed by Mr. J. A. McGee, who took for his subject "The Power of the Holy Spirit." His headings were, What is it? Do we need it? Can we get it? The ground he took was that to have spiritual power the Holy Spirit must dwell in us. Both discourses were very interesting and closely connected. The music was appropriate for the occasion. The meeting closed by Rev. J. C. Smith pronouncing the benediction.

The meeting tonight will be held in St. Andrew's church, and the speakers will be Rev. Mr. Cunningham and Mayor Sleeman.
