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CARVELL WILL SPEAK

The people of the county will welcome the opportunity of hearing F. B. Carvell, M. P., speak at Hartland and Centreville. That he should give an account of his stewardship as soon after the close of the session as possible has been the desire of his supporters. Mr. Carvell has been much in the lime-light during the past few months, and at this time to publicly confront his constituents is in direct keeping with the stand he took at Ottawa. Newspaper accounts are biased, sometimes extremely so, and to hear the story first-hand, with an opportunity of asking questions is a certain privilege to the electors.

There are also provincial affairs to be discussed at the meetings by Mr. Carvell and others. It is important that all voters should attend the advertised meetings; at Centreville tomorrow (Thursday) evening; at Hartland on Friday evening at 8 sharp.

GET READY

Four years ago yesterday in a general election the Flemming government practically swept the province. Another election is now due, but just when the government will take the plunge has not been announced. There is no doubt that at a meeting at Fredericton yesterday some decision was reached. Doubtless the result of the Nova Scotia election will have some bearing on the matter. It is true that the government could hold another session, but as there are more than half a dozen vacant seats, it would not be surprising if a general election was called instead of filling the vacancies by bye-elections.

It has been rumored that B. Frank Smith, M. L. A., falls heir to the portfolio of the Minister of Public Works and that the government was to have made the appointment yesterday. In this case he would need to come back to the people for re-election, which would mean, at least, a bye-election for the purpose of ratifying his appointment and for filling the vacancy made by the retirement of Donald Munro, M. L. A.

There is pretty sure to be an election in Carleton before many weeks, therefore it behooves the voters to get ready. The record of the government is before the people, who not alone are sick of it. The government itself is rent with internal dissension. A newspaper that has been supporting it says "the government needs to be reformed from within." J. L. Stewart, president of the Northumberland Conservative Association, says in his paper, Chatham World, "the way to reform this government is to kick it out."

It seems hardly possible that an outfit of men so discredited could be returned to power. The

"old government" was entirely shattered in 1908, and the present Opposition party is not altogether the remnant of the once powerful party that held the office, let us admit, a term too long. What the province needs is good, honest government and a breaking away from graft and the patronage system. This may not be accomplished at once, but if members are chosen from among our best men a start will be made in the right direction.

Practically all Liberals in the province favor the Opposition party, but there are many Conservatives who are sickened with the carnival of plunder that has been carried on and will vote against the government. At a recent meeting of the Opposition in Fredericton some resolutions were passed which we commend to the voters of Carleton.

It is the people's duty to elect a party of clean men pledged to honest administration of provincial affairs. It will be the people's duty and privilege to turn down every member who betrays the trust reposed in him.

Following are the resolutions referred to:

"Whereas this conference of the county convenors of the Opposition party in this province desires to place itself on record as being absolutely and unalterably opposed to the use of any corrupt methods in the carrying on of any election, and believes that the said electoral corruption is the source of all the evil doing which have been revealed in the investigations which have been held in this province during the last few years; therefore,

"Resolved, that this conference reaffirms the principle laid by the St. John convention in connection with this determination not to countenance in any respect the use of corrupt or illegal methods in connection with the running of any election; and further

"Resolved, that in the opinion of this conference any person known to be guilty of any corrupt act in connection with any election should be prosecuted."

MRS. C. T. PHILLIPS DEAD

The death occurred yesterday morning of Georgia Doucett, widow of the Rev. Dr. C. T. Phillips who died five years ago. Mrs. Phillips was visiting at the home of her daughter, Mrs. George Margison, at Presque Isle, when a week before her death she was stricken with paralysis from which she never rallied. She leaves four daughters: Misses Kate, Mabel and Maude of Fort Fairfield, and Mrs. Margison of Presque Isle.

The body will be brought to Woodstock today and the funeral will be held there tomorrow at 2.30 from the United Baptist church. The remains will be laid beside those of her husband at Upper Woodstock.

Mrs. Phillips was born at Deer Island about 70 years ago, the daughter of a Free Baptist minister, Rev. Cyril Doucett. She leaves three brothers, Henry N. and J. Walter Doucett of Knowlesville and Leonard Doucett in Saskatchewan. Mrs. C. A. Lewin of Benton is a sister and the first Mrs. D. McLeod Vince was also a sister.

The deceased had many friends, particularly in Woodstock, Hartland, Jacksonville, St. John and Sussex, in each of which places her husband served long pastorates.

The Observer is told that a cess-pool has been dug within 100 feet of the springs that furnish Hartland with the finest water on earth, and those who claim to know say that pollution of the springs from the cesspool is almost certain. It is not believed the party responsible for the cesspool has the slightest evil intention but this paper has been asked to draw attention to what is a fact.
