ANOTHER TRIAL. Leipzig, May 23.—The Supreme Court today set aside the verdict of the lower court under which Maximilian Harden, the Berlin editor, was found guilty of libelling Count Von Moltke, and ordered that the case be retried by the lower court.

MANY DROWNED. Brussels, May 23.—Despatches received here from the west coast of Africa announce that the steamer Ville de Bruges has been sunk by a tornado on the Upper Congo. Six Europeans and 48 blacks were drowned.
