

SASKATOON, March 3 .- While in Saskatoon, President Beatty of the C.P.R., said that it depended almost entirely on the labor market as to whether his company would do much construction work this year, and no doubt, that will be the chief obstacle. For the past few years the class of labor formerly employed in railway construction has actually left the country for Europe to a greater extent than it has ever come from there. There are rumors that an effort may be made to bring Chinese coolies from the Orient to Canada for this work, to be sent back after the present conditions change. on the same basis that they were sent to the Western front in France during the war. This would help to solve the problem, but nothing definite has been heard regarding it so far.


