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

MAY BE ALIVE IN **BOWELS OF EARTH**

Hope Miners May be Rescued From the Third Level.

******* FIRE BREAKS OUT AGAIN.

ALL RESCUE WORK STOPPED Cherry, Ills., Nov. 23-Fire has broken out with renewed violence in the second gallery of the St. Paul mine and now threatens the main shaft. All work of rescue has ceased, while the entire working force available is fighting the fire. Mine Manager Taylor is in charge of the work. Cherry, Ills., Nov. 22.-A last fororn hope to rescue any living miners. who may be walled up in the St. Paul ine, is being led tonight into the hird level of the burning pit.

Cherry is mad with excitement and anger over the way the rescue work has been dragging along and the descent of the little party of rescuers o the dreaded third level was forced this evening by the state executive committee of the United Mine Workers of America. With the Cherry e men who are either dead or dying n the doomed mine, demanding that e third level be explored, the state ine inspectors reluctantly yielded the insistent demands and order

ed that the descent be made.

There is little liklihood that any ne still lives in the mine. Even the miners succeeded in walling themselves in, it is probable that they have succumbed to starvation by his ime. One pocket was found late this afternoon where thirty-eight miners had failed in their last struggle for life. Black damp had crep into the chamber and snuffed out the lives of every one of the men who had taken efuge there from the flames. When the fact of the discovery of the bodies became known in Cherry, the little village became wildly excited. Crowls ed at once. At the same tim state executive committee, headed by Workers, passed a resolution demanding that a descent be made at once to the third level.

Four bodies were brought. out of the pit about daylight this morning. This leaves 189 miners still

unaccounted for, according to the best estimates that can be given by Robert McFadden and Barney Dougherty, expert miners, penetrated the thrid level of the St. Paul mine at that they believed that most of the 150 miners in the level were safe behind "Bradishes" they had built. The two miners went 120 feet into the levl and colsed a trap door between two shafts which sent fresh air ruso ing back into the furthest parts of
