Supposed Victim of Titanic

RETURNS HOME.

Lady Missionary for Whom Funeral Services Were Held.

Baltimore, Md., August 9. — Miss Maud Powell, a missionary, mourned as lost in the sinking of the Titanic, and for whom funeral services were held in a church near her home in Washington, Penn., arrived home today, greatly frightening her family, who at first thought she was a spectre. She was amazed to learn that she was supposed to have been drowned when the vessel went down near the Newfoundland banks.

Miss Powell had intended sailing on the Titanic, but at the last minute

took passage on the North German Lloyd line, tarrying in London to see the sights. Her friends and relatives heard nothing further, and when the Titanic went down, and no trace of her could be secured among the survivors, it was taken for granted that she had been drowned, and her funeral services were held.

Miss Powell credits her escape from the Titanic disaster to her childhood interest in Westminster Abbey. All her life, she says, she had been anxious to see that historic place, and when she reached London she could not tear herself away.

The scho. Molaine, Capt. Davis, which was coasting since May last, arrived from Grosvenor Bay, Labrador, early yesterday morning with a cargo of lumber for the Howwood Lumber Company. Capt. Davis reports that fish are very plentiful all along the Labrador Coast. At Indian Harbor, Cape Harrison and Grady, the residents have more fish than they can attend to curing. Capt. Davis also reports that recently a number of salt cargoes have arrived, and which have relieved the famine. Several vessels are expected home from the Labrador shortly.

Fogota Back.

Trap Fishery North Over—Average Catch Exceeded.

The S. S. Fogota, Capt. B. Barbour, returned from the northward yesterday afternoon, after an excellent round trip. Fine weather was continuous. The steamer reached Change Islands, the terminus, on Thursday evening last and made a fine run south. She brought a full freight and forty passengers.

Open Air Service

Mr. Sutherland officiated and delivered an instructive and impressive address. Return to their armoury was made via LeMarchant Road and Military Road. 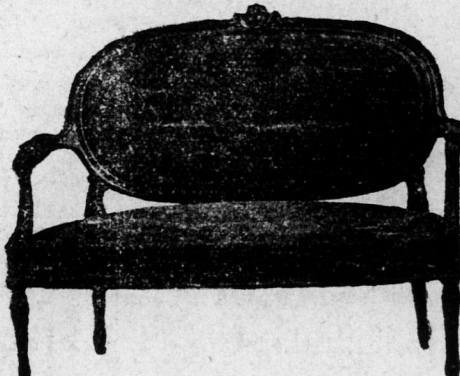
