LONDON, June 26.
Thomas Ryan was awarded \$500 and costs against the White Star, for the loss of his son in the Titanic. A similar award was made in two other cases. The award was by agreement.

PRINCE ALBERT,
June 26.

Eighty-five foxes valued at \$500,000, were shipped yesterday for Charlottetown. A second shipment is to follow. Many valuable specimens are arriving from the north.

LONDON, June 26.

The Montenegrin Premier has arrived at Belgrade, ready to accompany Premier Pashitch to Petersburg, where the Balkan Premiers had arranged to meet, but in view of recent developments the result of the Skupstina is anxiously awaited.

LEIPZIG, June 26.

A former policeman named Jaehne, of Wilhelmshaven, was sentenced to six years' imprisonment for espionage. He, with two other policemen and a German naval warrant officer, obtained possession of a navy signal book, which they sold to England or France.

DUSSELDORF,
Germany, June 26.

The German Steel Syndicate today reduced the price of steel by \$1.25 a ton. This is the first reduction from recent high prices, marking the existence of the prevailing business reaction. A number of rolling mills have begun operating at reduced working hours.

LONDON, June 26.

According to Serbian reports the battle at Zhitova, near Istip, yesterday, was a serious one. Whether this outbreak will obstruct the projected Russian arbitration by strengthening the war party, will be seen when Premier Pashitch, with his reconstructed ministry, meets the Skupstina at an extraordinary session today. A rumour gained currency in Belgrade today that the Pashitch Cabinet had again resigned, but this

is not confirmed. It is quite possible that reports of the battle, of which no news has been received from the Bulgarian side may be greatly exaggerated.

BELGRADE, June 26.

The official report says that when the Servians went into action, heavy forces of Bulgarians broke and fled, leaving many dead and wounded, and abandoning all the positions they had besieged in Servian territory. According to advices, 1,500 Bulgarian troops with 500 bomb-throwers, attacked the Servian position at Zhitova. Eventually the Servians charged with fixed bayonets, and all along the line the Bulgarians retreated. The combined losses exceeded 500 men.

LONDON, June 26.

In honor of Alexandra Day, a bunch of roses was put up at auction yesterday, at Christie's, during the sale of Sir John Murray Scott's collection, and was purchased by Bond Street dealers for \$42. Scores of peonies have been selling roses in the streets today, the money going to the charities in which Queen Alexandra is interested. London was a garden, everyone from the peer to the costermonger, wearing them. Every vehicle had pink and white flowers somewhere. Twenty thousand women acted as sellers. President Poincaré paid \$25 at York House for a small garland. No one escaped. Queen Alexandra, accompanied by Queen Mary, drove through the city. As she passed through the Strand, she handed roses, with which her carriage was full, to several poor people who ran out from the curb to receive them. As the two Queens drove without an escort, there was no one to hinder the receipt of them, and this incident was noted with much enthusiasm by the spectators.

LONDON, June 26.

Contrary to expectations the Terra Nova will not be brought to London for exhibition. She has been repurchased by Messrs. Bowring Brothers, and will proceed shortly to St. John's, and be employed again in the sealfishery. There was much disappointment at Cardiff because the vessel has not been thrown open to the public.

Students Use Soda Syphons on Professors.

New York, June 21.—A London cable says:

Lively scenes marked the summer graduation ceremony at Glasgow University, yesterday. Principal Sir Donald MacAlister, who presided, was accompanied by Lord Provost Stevenson, whose recent attitude toward Lord Roberts' campaign has been causing some feeling among the students.

When the civic chief appeared he was greeted with stentorian cries of "Put out the Lord Provost!"

Several professors left the platform and mixed among the undergraduates to restore order, but the students aimed themselves with seltzer water syphons and easily succeeded in routing the Professors. The capping ceremony was carried out practically in dumb show.

Bubonic Plague Raging in Hayti.

Port au Prince, Hayti, June 17.—An epidemic of bubonic plague has broken out at the seaport of Jacmel, 30 miles from here.

Numerous cases have been reported, of which many have resulted fatally.

Jacmel has been isolated from the rest of the country by a cordon of troops, and the government is taking energetic steps to prevent the spread of the disease.

The administrative authorities here, in spite of the detailed reports from Jacmel, deny the existence of bubonic plague there.

Murderers Send Body To 'Varsity Laboratory

Rome, June 17.—The police have just discovered that a wealthy old man, named Benzullo, and his nephew, who disappeared six years ago, were enticed to a house and murdered by Camorristas, and that subsequently, the bodies of the murdered men were sent to the anatomical laboratory of the University where they were dissected. In this way all trace of the murderers was destroyed.

CARBONAR, June 26.

Conference this morning was addressed by the Rev. James G. Moore, D. D., a native of this town, but now Presiding Elder of the Grand Forks District of the North Dakota Methodist Episcopal Church, and by the Rev. Dr. Endicott, of Toronto. In the afternoon the missionary report was presented and discussed, the announcement being made that to-day Newfoundland Methodism is nearly self-sustaining. For the coming year \$20,000 is the figure aimed at for missions. A motion to have a local superintendent for Missions only was rejected. Tonight the Conference Missionary Meeting will be held, the scheduled speakers being Rev. Dr. Endicott, and Rev. W. T. D. Dunn, a former pastor of the Conference Church. — Daily News.
