'Time for a Change.'

That is What the People Say

Cable News. Special to The Evening Telegram. TOKIO, To-day. The assassination of Morihiro Abe, Director of the political bureau of the Japanese Foreign Office inflamed the masses to-day and a dramatic chapter in the history of the new Japan, written. Fifteen thousand persons gathered at a mass meeting in Hibiyapark, calling for military action against China. The Majority of these marched to the Foreign Office and clamored for admission. They demanded the despatch of troops to China to take such measures as were necessary to get satisfaction for the killing of the Japanese at Nanking, or failing this, the resignation of the Minister of Foreign Affairs, Baron Nobuaki Makino. The speakers denounced the emptiness of Japanese diplomacy in connection with California and China, and insisted that the insult to the Japanese flag of Nanking should be wiped out. The Manifestation is clearly an explosion of popular resentment against the Ministry in its treatment of California and Chinese questions. Profiting by the lesson of the riots which followed the conclusion of peace between the Russian and Japanese Government it reduced the risk of violence by refusing to allow a single soldier or policeman at the scene of manifestations, many of whom were students and were orderly. During the early part of the proceedings, a score of agitators, including a girl, declared Japanese diplomacy, and declared it had never contributed to the upholding of the Empire, and had ended in failure. The incidents in China were unbearable. Suddenly a cry to march on the Foreign Office was raised. There was a general stampede, and many persons barely escaped being crushed.
